In the Letter Box

To the Editor,

Dear Sir:—Regarding the letter signed "W. E. Williams" published in The Daily News of the 29th inst., criticising certain articles, Mr. Williams says that one is "without qualification reprehensible." Mr. Williams here states his own opinion as a fact, which displays a very arrogant state of mind. Does he prove it to be so? He calls the news of the arrest "supposed evidence." How does he know it is only supposed? He fails to cite the testimony of one single witness to prove it only supposed. Mr. Williams' statement regarding "lynch law" is rubbish, and as for "contempt of court," that is as yet outside Mr. Williams' province.

He speaks of a British subject, who has an ordinary public school education being guilty of a lapse, etc. Would it not be well for Mr. Williams to turn his attention to his own letter? Does Mr. Williams not acknowledge the freedom of the press? Is any interested attorney to be permitted to censor the press? As to egotism, unjustness, unfairness, viciousness, improper influence over a court, etc., would not these terms be quite fitting to the letter of Mr. W. E. Williams.

Why does not the council for the defence produce evidence instead of writing for publication? Must he appeal to public sentiment with a "reprehensible" letter?

Like Mr. Williams, I regret having to write this article, but we should remember that it is our duty to avoid limiting the freedom of speech and the freedom of the press to the will and the prejudices and desires of any certain citizen or citizens.

WOULD WELCOME
AMERICAN TROOPS

Paris, March 28.—An official of the French military organization, discussing the political and military situation today, said regarding American participation in the war:

"It is often said America's role must necessarily be confined to material and financial aid to the Allies, with certain naval co-operation, but that actual participation of American military forces in Europe is out of the question. Personally, I do not agree with this view. One hundred and thirty years ago, when transport facilities were very primitive compared with the present, France was able to send an army across the Atlantic to fight for American independence. All the more reason that America today should be able to send her troops to France.

"I hope we shall soon be able to welcome American soldiers on French soil. You have a proverb (this to an American correspondent) that blood is thicker than water. This will be borne out when American soldiers have fought side by side with French and Allied troops and shed their blood in the same cause.

"The moral factor involved is even more important than the material aid of American troops. The present war, in its last phase, appears, more than ever, a struggle of all the liberal, progressive nations to overthrow a reactionary, effete governmental system, as represented by the Central Powers of Europe, and Russia is about to become one. Germany and Austria alone stand for old orders. It is of the highest moral importance that the United States, the most progressive power in the world, should be represented in this new army of crusaders."

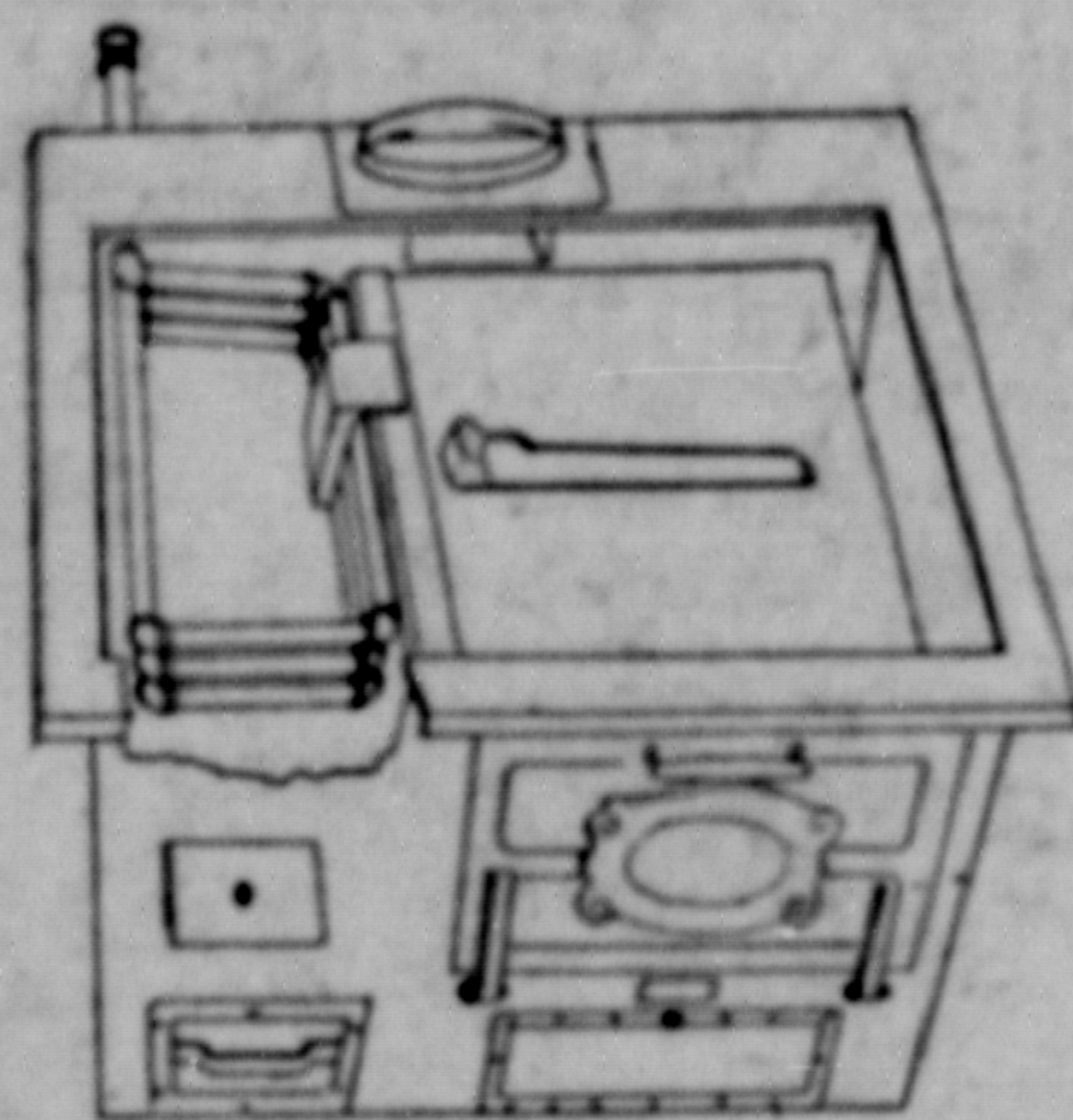

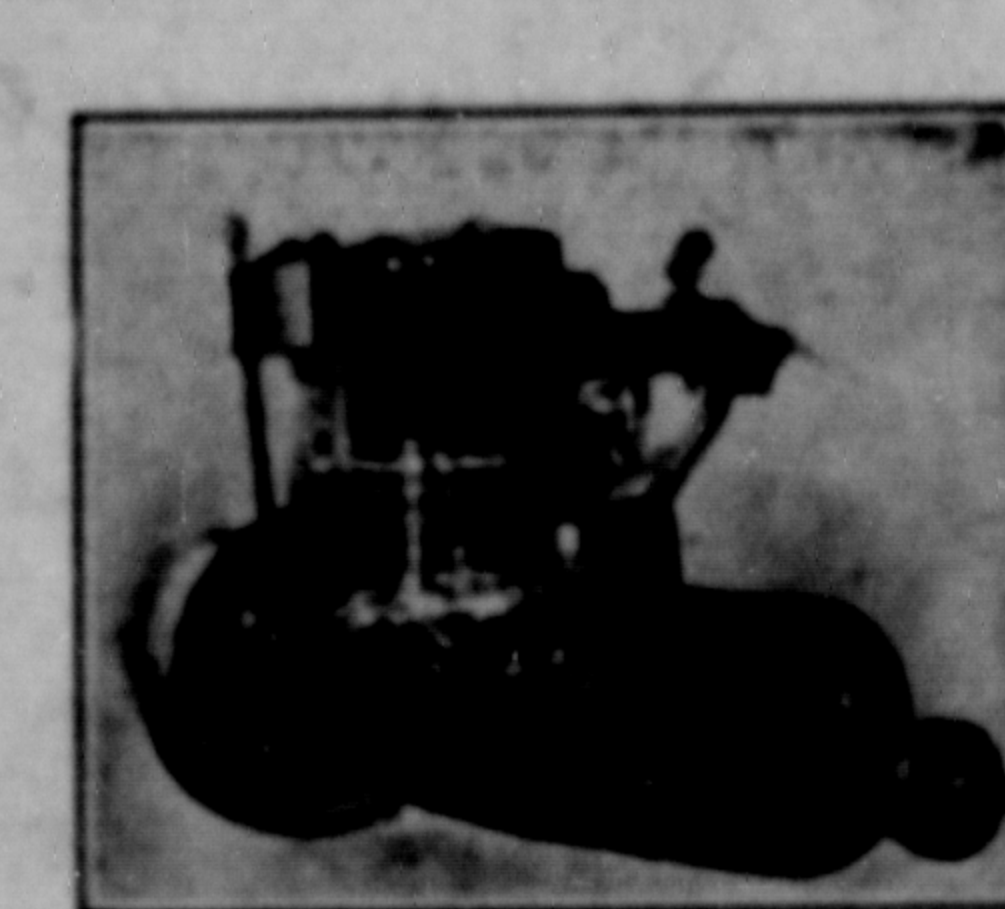
