Trade with Russia in Raw Materials and Manufactured

Germans Evacuating Towns Given to Poles by Treaty; Fighting Continues on Shore of Caspian Sea.

(Special to The News via G. T. P. Telegrams.)

PARIS, Jan. 20.—Plans for the resumption of commercial relations between Russia and the Allies are being worked out. It is anticipated that the Bolshevik will permit the free exchange of manufactured goods and raw materials.

BERLIN, Jan. 20.—The Poles have taken possession of Thorn in West Russia, which was given

to Poland by treaty. The place was evacuated by Germany yesterday. Possession will be given of Bromberg, in the province of Posen on Jan. 23.

LONDON, Jan. 20.—The Bolshevik outside of Krasnovodsk are under fire of the Caspian Sea fleet of General Denikine. The Bolsheviks have captured 35,000 prisoners but further advance of the Reds will prove difficult.

FORESHORE QUESTION AGAIN IS DISCUSSED

Morgan Letters Brought Before Council—Foresore Grant Hardly Municipal Matter.

Two letters from the J. R. Morgan Co., Ltd., one regarding the acceptance of city bonds in payment for street work and the other, asking to lease a site on the Cow Bay foreshore were again read at last night's council meeting. The first letter was referred to the Finance Committee and the other to the Board of Works.

Alderman Rochester did not feel that the city was holding up the foreshore from incoming industries. It was the Provincial Government that was causing the delay. Although he was in favor of hanging on to any chances the city had of getting foreshore he thought the Morgan Co. should know that the city was not responsible for the delay.

Alderman Casey did not see that this was business of the city. The provincial government was the custodian of the public foreshore and it was up to them to make these grants. It looked to him like an attempt on the part of the provincial government to throw the onus of delaying industry on the city.

Alderman McLennan agreed with Alderman Casey that this was not a city matter. The city had control of only 200 feet of waterfront off Section 2 and could not make grants. He was in favor of maintaining any claim the city had for foreshore.

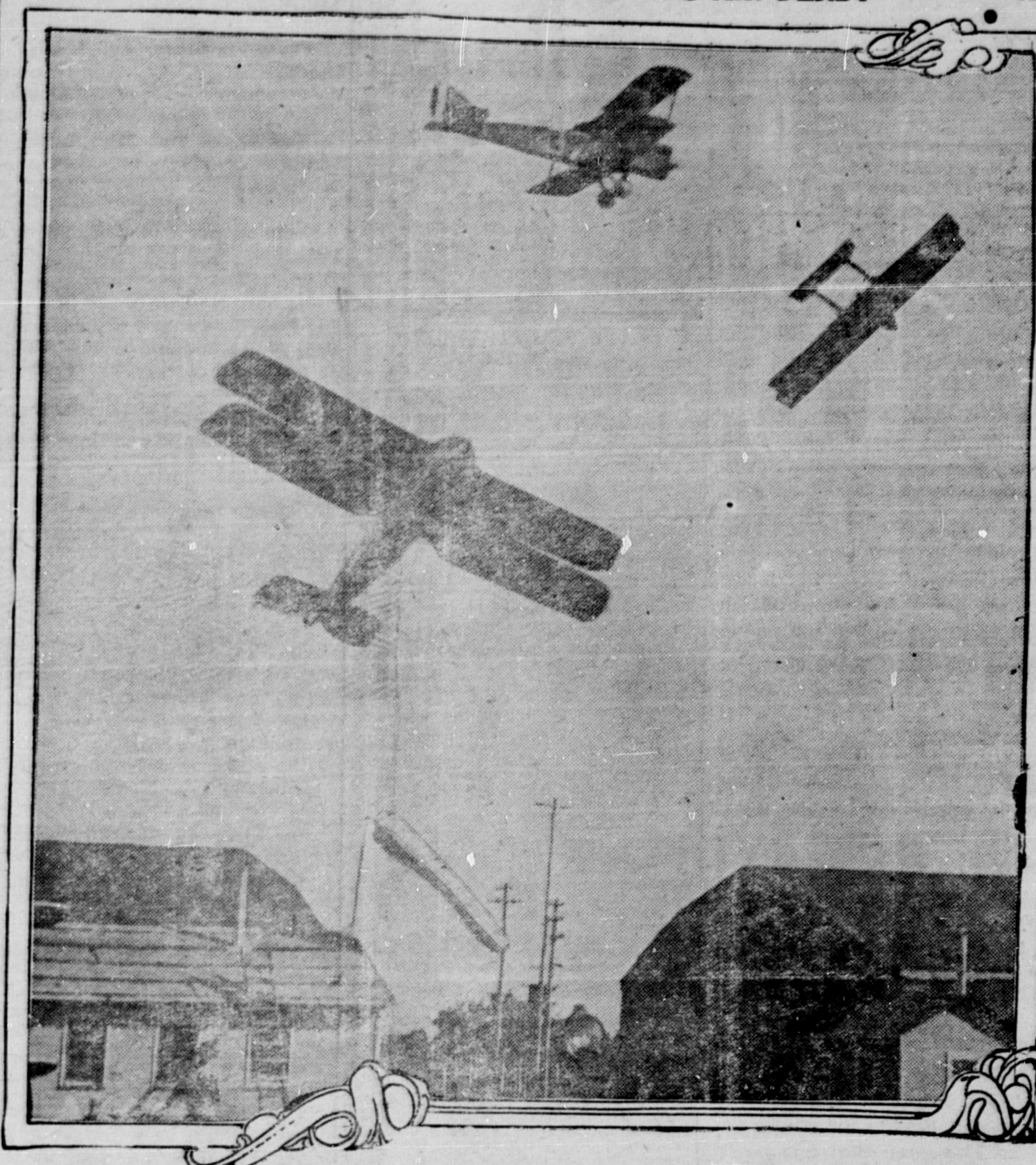

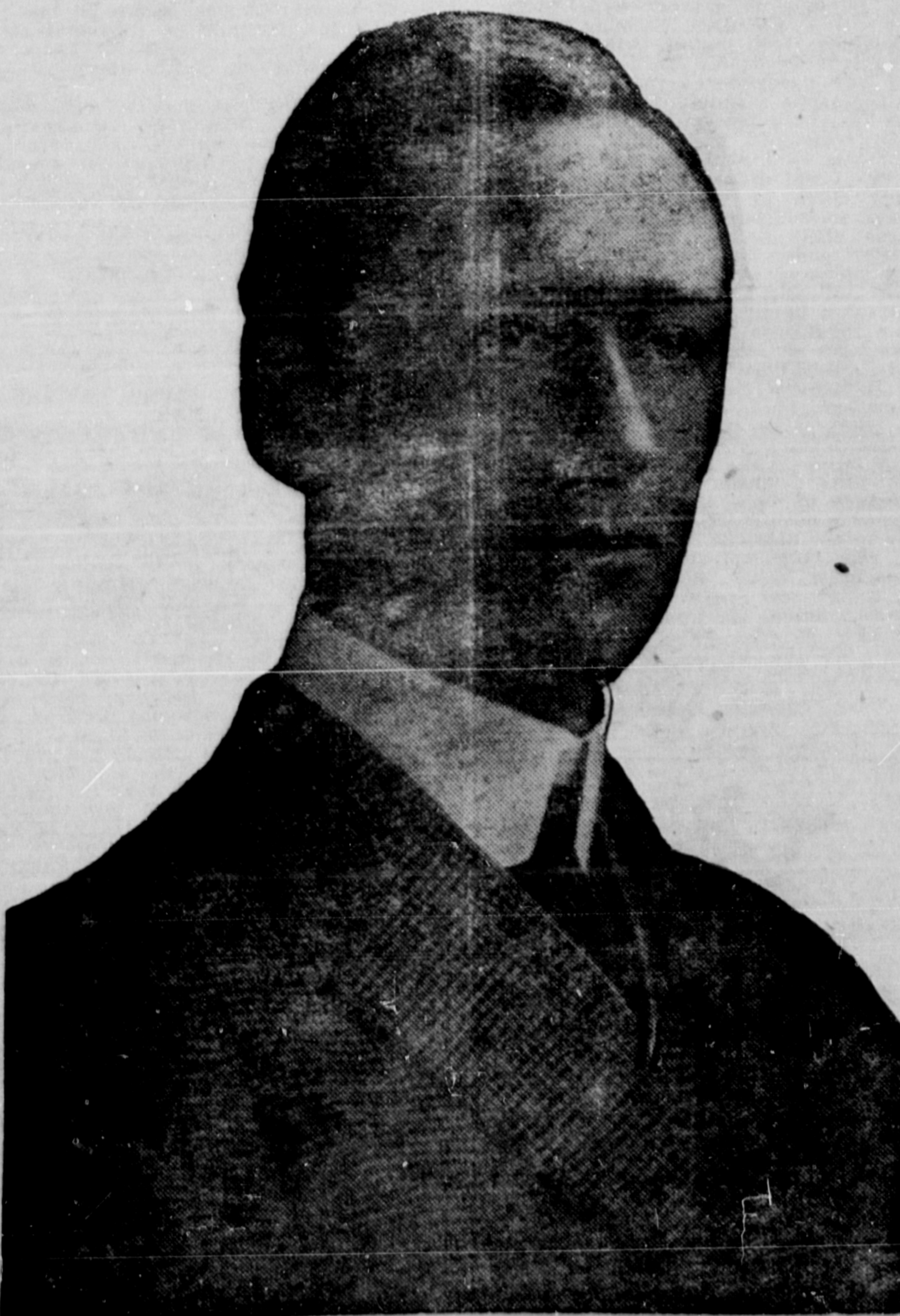

McCUTCHEON IS FINED HUNDRED

Pleads Not Guilty to Not Keeping Proper Record of Liquor Prescriptions.

W. J. McCutcheon, charged with not keeping a proper record of liquor prescriptions, plead guilty before Magistrate McMullin this morning and was fined \$100.50.

L. W. Patmore appearing for the accused stated that he had spoken to another local druggist and he had said it was almost impossible to keep the record up to the minute and attend to business at the same time. The law in this respect was broken quite frequently.

W. E. Williams, prosecutor, said that the law must be lived up to and it was not a difficult thing to do. If other local druggists broke the law, they would also find themselves in the Police Court some time.

Magistrate McMullin concurred with W. E. Williams that the records must be kept strictly.

SWANSON BAY LOGGER COMMITTED SUICIDE

Was Found Hanging From a Tree by a Cord; Insanity is Claimed by Witnesses.

The body of Julius Johnson, a Norwegian, was brought from Swanson Bay yesterday afternoon and is now at the B. C. Undertakers awaiting interment which will take place tomorrow. From the inquiry held by Coroner McMullin it appears that the deceased came to his death by suicide having hanged himself from the branch of a tree using a cord. He was working in a logging gang on Swindle Island and failing to turn up for dinner, search was made and he was found by a party before he had been dead an hour. He was said to have been somewhat stupid and insanity is attributed as the cause of his action. He had no effects and only paper was found on him giving his address as Lang, Saskatchewan. He was about 35 years of age.

COMMITTEES ANNOUNCED FOR YEAR 1920

Mayor Makes Brief Address Outlining Duties; Urges Immediate Action of Finance Committee.

In opening the first meeting of the 1920 city council last night, Mayor McClymont briefly gave a review of the work that would be facing the different committees during the coming year. For the Board of Works there would be, among their problems, the building of the Morse Creek Bridge, sewerage improvement and extension and the question of permanent streets.

The Public Utilities would find facing them the problem of extending the city's power plant. It is now almost taxed to capacity and new industries would probably want to come in that would desire power.

The Finance Committee would have to give support to these various committees and expedite their plans. The mayor suggested a conference of the Finance Committee with the city bankers immediately in order to make arrangement for the carrying on of work under the by-laws pending the flotation of the bond issues.

The following are the committees named for the year, the first name being that of the committee chairman:—

Finance Committee—Aldermen Rochester, and McLennan and Mayor McClymont.

Board of Works and Cemetery—Aldermen Casey, Currie and Kerr.

Public Utilities Committee—Aldermen Murray and Perry.

Fisheries—Aldermen Dybhavn and Casey.

Exhibition—Aldermen Currie, (one more alderman to be named.)

Reading Room—Aldermen Kerr and Rev. T. H. Nuttall, John Buckley and James McNulty.

Better Housing Committee—Aldermen Rochester, Alderman McLennan, City Clerk, City Treasurer and Building Inspector.

Court of Revision—(Sitting on February 8)—Mayor McClymont, Alderman Rochester, Alderman McLennan, Alderman Casey, Alderman Perry and City Clerk (secretary).

SOLDIER SETTLEMENT NEW OFFICE TO OPEN

OTTAWA, Jan. 20.—The Soldier Settlement Board has decided to open a new office at Vernon, B.C., relieving the strain on Vancouver and Victoria.

Alderman Perry, at last night's council meeting, signified his pleasure in especially welcoming Alderman McLennan to the Council Board as a connecting link between the School Board and the City Council. Alderman Perry stated that he did not want to delay operations on the new school but suggested that the school board put their plans and tabulations in better shape and also reconsider the water main problem. Alderman McLennan felt that the by-law should be passed by the city solicitor to ensure its legality.
