Edwin Hilton, janitor of the Central School, received from the War Office last Tuesday, the Military Medal which he won as sergeant at Hill 70 when he obtained valuable information which resulted in the rout of the enemy in an action at that point.

Charles A. Pyne, local agent for the Sovereign Life Insurance Co., has been appointed manager for the entire province of British Columbia.

From all indications there is to be a big influx of settlers in the Salmon River district this year. A road is to be put into the valley by the government, it is believed, which will branch off from the main road at Summit Lake. Several people from the Central states are considering settling there this spring. Much interest is being taken in the district by Scandinavian farmers in Minnesota.

The annual report of the Police Magistrate for this city shows a total of 161 cases dealt with in the Police Court, with 132 convictions secured. The large majority of the cases were for disorderly houses with breaches of the Prohibition Act coming second. The amount secured in fines penalties and costs amounted to \$4,465.50.
