FISHING REGULATIONS ALASKAN TERRITORY

By an order signed by the Secretary of War April 16 and made public yesterday by Lieut .- Col. J .-A. Woodruff, U. S. A., district negineer in Seattle, floating pound nets and fish traps in the navigable waters of Alaska are limited this year to a length of 2,400 feet over all, says the Seattle Times.

Issuance of the order was opposed by Alaska salmon packing concerns, several of which had begun preparing larger traps for the coming season. Colonel Woodruff yesterday sent copies of the War Department's new regulation to the interests affected. It follows:

Regulations approved March vigable waters of Alaska amended by the Secretary of War, April 16. The table given is for Port 1920, by inclusion of following
