Ship Contracts In the Offing.

Apparently there are ship contracts in the offing. Newman Erb when in the west spoke of more contracts having been offered and it now seems as if all the large shippers were interested in the securing of these contracts and were asking the Government to help them finance. Just what it means no one here seems to know. What we are interested in is getting more contracts for the yards here. If the shippers continue working steadily we shall continue to prosper. If there should be no more contracts we should have to struggle harder to hold our own. As there is still a considerable shortage of shipping it is to be assumed that an effort will be made to have all the steel yards kept busy.

Gas Boats Again Under Discussion.

In his address to the Board of Trade and to the delegates from the fisheries convention at the Central Hotel yesterday, W. E. Williams spoke at some length on the desirability of using gas boats on the river. He expressed the opinion that a self-respecting white man would not undergo the hardships that go with fishing in an open boat at the mouth of the Skeena River. The result was that the business was chiefly in the hands of foreigners of the yellow race. If gas boats could be used, the fishermen could live in the boat in something like comfort.

Another advantage of the use of the gas boat as outlined by Mr. Williams was that fishermen could then sell their fish wherever they wished. If necessary there could be a fish exchange where all the fish might be marketed. Today, however, it was impossible with the row boats to take the fish to any but the nearby canneries.

Domestic Work In the Schools.

The decision of the school trustees to make the study of domestic science absolutely compulsory for those attending the high school is most satisfactory. Passing examination is purely a minor matter. Making a good standing in class is not very important, but being able to cook or to superintend cooking, to make a bed properly, and to generally care for children and the household is the most important work a girl can learn. It is indispensable to a happy married life.

The reason for much of the domestic discord, is the failure of the woman to run her end of the partnership in an efficient and capable manner. Domestic science is not something that comes naturally to a girl. Like all other callings it has to be learned. Even if a girl is not intending to be married, she will probably want to keep house for herself, and domestic science is then most valuable.

Among the Negroes of the southern states, the great ambition of the students in the early days of freedom, was to learn Latin and to become members of one of the learned professions. Booker Washington taught them that the one important aim should be to do useful work well and to earn a living and make themselves useful in the community. The same lesson needs to be learned in every white community. To do the common things of life well is much more important than any of the frills, and should be insisted on by every school board.

The time used is Pacific Standard, for the 120th Meridian west. It is counted from 0 to 24 hours, from midnight to midnight.

The table given is for Port Simpson but the time for Prince Rupert varies only a few minutes on some days and on others is the same. The range of the tide may be computed as 5 per cent greater at Prince Rupert than at Port Simpson both at springs and neaps. Therefore the rise in the Prince Rupert harbor is slightly greater than Port Simpson.

The height is in feet and tenths of feet above the average level of lower low water.

DOMESTIC WORK IS COMPULSORY

School Board Makes Decision Regarding Girls of First and Second Years High School.

After considerable discussion by the School Board last night, it was decided to make domestic science a compulsory part of the school curriculum for the first and second years of high school, two periods per week to be devoted to it if necessary. The decision was the outcome of a full investigation of the matter of high school girls not attending the classes regularly, as reported by Miss Marcellus at the previous meeting of the School Board. Principal Brady had been called to the meeting to go into the matter and he was present last night.

Principal in Favor.

Mr. Brady explained that he himself was in favor of domestic science for the girls, but the school board had not made it compulsory. It was his view, based on the reports of the mothers, that too much domestic science homework was given. He did not think that domestic science homework should be given to conflict with the girls' music and their high school homework.

Miss Marcellus then gave her side of the question, maintaining that with only one period a week for the high school girls it was impossible to train them in both household science and domestic art without homework. At that, the homework was not heavy and would not entail more than half an hour a week.

Unanimous Support.

The members of the board seemed unanimous in their support of Miss Marcellus and the work she was carrying on. Dr. W. T. Kergin, chairman, stated that as far as he was concerned domestic science was more important to the girls than either music or Latin and there was no reason why they should not have homework in it, even if it was at the expense of those subjects. The other members of the board were in line behind the chairman and added their voice in favor of domestic science.
