COW BAY IS DISCUSSED AT BOARD MEETING

Joint Committee of Council and Board of Trade to Report.

The Board of Trade at its meeting last night decided to ask the City Council to appoint a committee to meet a committee of the Board and to take up the whole matter of the Cow Bay difference and try to arrive at an understanding. President Parker will appoint the Board committee and the mayor is to be asked to appoint an equal number from the council. This committee to go thoroughly into the various proposals which have been made with a view to a settlement.

The question of a level crossing to the provincial government docks, and the suggested transfer of the properties at Cow Bay with a view to developing the waterfront adjoining the Boat Club and possibly the closing of the bay will all be gone into and recommendations made.

Action was brought about following the report from the chairman of the Port Committee who sent in a written report although he was not present in person. The report said:

Docks for Small Boats.
"Replying to your letter of July 7th regarding resolution passed at the last monthly meeting relative to wharf facilities for small craft, with particular reference to securing temporary space between the 'Hazelton' and the Imperial Oil Dock, would say:

"Your committee has gone into this matter and find—owing to the City holding up the Cow Bay proposition that the water frontage referred to is in such an unsettled state that no progress can be made. Further they are of the opinion that if the facilities for the fishing fleet are gone on with at Seal Cove; that ample provision can be made at the floats now installed between the government dock and Cow Bay for the mooring of small boats having traffic to and from this port. These facilities would probably have to be changed or further improved to suit the conditions of the traffic that would be required of them.

"We would suggest that a letter be written to the City Council asking them what their intention is in regard to the Cow Bay frontage."

Good Plans.
President Parker said he had seen the plans for the development of the docks and they were very reasonable. They provided for a level crossing at Cow Bay, practically at the same place that the road now crossed. It would make the docks much more ready of access and at a better grade than the present approach.

G. W. Nickerson suggested that the matter should be settled at once and moved a resolution to the effect that committees from the Board and the City Council confer in regard to it.

BOARD AGAIN URGES A PARCEL DELIVERY

Letter to be Written Board of Railway Commissioners Regarding Express Companies' Duties.

On motion of L. M. deGex, the Board of Trade at its meeting last night decided to again write the Board of Railway Commissioners asking that the express companies be instructed to put on a parcel delivery at this point. It was stated that the company was asking for an increase in rates, but that they delivered their parcels only part of the way. They were expected to deliver them at the house, but did not do so. Now that people here were purchasing a lot of sawdust from Montreal the company should have to do its part.

The secretary was instructed to write the Commissioners to that effect, Mr. deGex to aid in drafting the letter.

In the city police court this morning John Tokarski was charged under the vagrancy act for being drunk and doing damage to a bicycle. Apparently John had been slightly inebriated and while feeling good, threw the bicycle over a fence at Fulton St. Constable Wisely brought the man in and this morning he was fined \$50 and \$40 to be paid for the damages done to the machine.

CONSTANTINOPLE, August 7.—The Reds are fleeing from General Wrangle who claims a victory over the Bolsheviki. He reports the capture of 4,000 prisoners in a recent action.

FELL FROM BICYCLE, DIED SOON AFTER

Detective Succumbs on Way to Hospital at Edmonton.

EDMONTON, August 7.—Harry Yale, a detective in the service of the International agency, died suddenly Tuesday morning while being taken to the Misericordia hospital, where he was being conveyed after having been picked up in an unconscious condition on 118th street.

Mr. Yale, it appears, was riding on a bicycle along 118th street about nine o'clock when he was seen to fall from the wheel by M. Hunnalls who immediately went to his assistance, and finding him insensible, phoned for Howard and McBride's ambulance. On the way to the hospital he recovered consciousness and was able to give his name and the address of his place of business. Again he lapsed into unconsciousness and died before reaching the hospital.

Dr. D. A. McGibbon viewed the body and gave it as his opinion that death was due to apoplexy.

Coroner Dr. Harry Smith was called and gave instructions to detective John Watson to make an investigation but it is not thought likely that an inquest will be ordered.

Deceased was a single man, aged about 45 years. He lived at the Collier Hotel and has been in the city a number of years.
