Russian Situation Improves Slightly

ATTEMPT TO CAPTURE BANDITS ENDS IN DEATH OF ONE AND TWO POLICEMEN

Blockade of Russian Ports Is Once More Effective

**Soviet Delegation in London promises Armistice will
Become Effective Tonight; Preparations
for Military Measures**

WARSAW, August 9.—The Reds are reported only sixty
miles away from here.

THE, England, August 9.—The Bolsheviks having refused
their demand to conclude a ten days' truce with Poland, the
British and French premiers are in consultation today with a view
to the Poles. The Russian blockade has become effective
and is hoped by this means to bring the Reds to time.
The military chiefs are also in consultation with a view to
Poland by the use of Military measures.

LONDON, August 9.—The Soviet delegation here in a con-
fidential message says that Russia is ready to grant Poland an
armistice commencing tonight.

PLACIOUS CHARGES

age, and C. Williams.

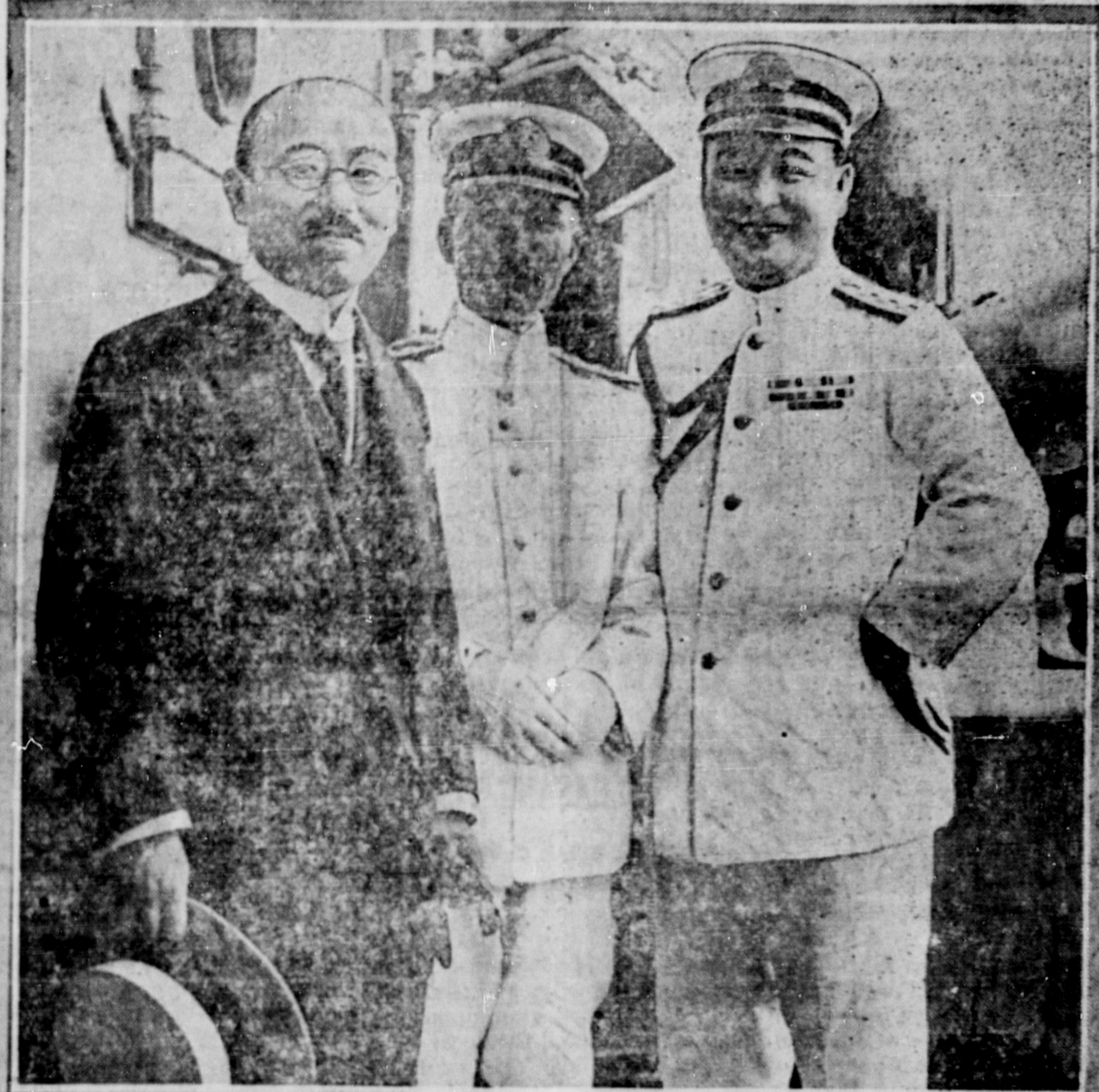
CO-ORDINATION FIRST WORK OF NEW MANAGER

WARSHIPS FOR THE BLACK SEA

Was Committed for Trial in Police Court Today

**John Karkle Confessed to having Taken Articles and
Money from Cigar Store and Grocery**

In the police court before Magistrate McMordie this morning
John Karkle was committed for trial on the two charges of break-
ing into and stealing from the premises of the Prince Rupert
billiard parlor and cigar store and from the Prince Rupert Table
Supply. The accused who has confessed to the police will likely
come before Judge Young this afternoon and if he then pleads
guilty, sentence will probably be passed at once. The arrest of
Karkle on Saturday afternoon and the consequent finding of the
tobacco pouches, etc., at his home has cleared up the mystery
of the robbery of two weeks ago.

Chas. Embleton told this morning of how the premises of
the Prince Rupert Billiard Parlor had been entered by a window
removed at the back. A number of articles had been stolen and,
although he could not identify any of the exhibits produced this
morning, he stated that he thought that the firm which he
represented was the sole agents for the city.

Was Arrested.
Constables Adams and Mc-
Glinchey told of having arrested
the accused on Saturday after-
noon at 2:30. He was cautioned
and a pipe found in his posses-
sion led to the search being made
at his home on First Avenue.
There in various rooms the dif-
ferent brands of cigar boxes were
found and also the pouches.

BELLEVUE, Alta, August 9.—At a point close to the B. C.
boundary mounted police constable Usher, provincial constable
Bailey and Alberta Bassoff, the bandit, were all killed on Satur-
day afternoon in a gun fight. The police officers surprised the
Sentinel train robbers eating in a restaurant on Saturday after-
noon. Earlier the bandits had been driven from cover and had
failed in an attempt to buy bread at Coleman. They moved next
in the direction of Bellevue and were getting a meal there when
the police dropped on them.

"Hands up," demanded the police.
The order was answered by a fusillade, the fatalities occurring
in the street outside.

Arloff and a companion were wounded but escaped to Turtle

Bassoff while dying shot fourteen holes through Constable
Usher, while Arloff and Akroff escaped among the debris and
rocks at the scene of the landslide at Frank.

Police bloodhounds are en route from Seattle and it is ex-
