WAR AGAINST IGNORANCE

General Sir Arthur Currie Urges Development of Balance and Poise

"We are standing together in another set of trenches today waging a war against injustice and ignorance, and to me the hope of any effective solution of the problems of the country is linked with the educational institutions of the nation," said Canada's most distinguished soldier, General Sir Arthur Currie, G.C.M.G., K.C.B., LL.D., in a splendid address on "The Influence of Canadian Universities in Canadian Development."

Out for Leaves and Fishes It was the university that should be the training ground for life, Sir Arthur averred, and it was the burden of duty of every man to attend the university if he could and fit himself for the business of life. Education and knowledge must be applied to all the problems of the nation, the speaker contended. To find relief from the burden of taxation the wealth that had been destroyed during the past years of war would have to be made up, but "today, more than ever," he said, "men seem to be out for the leaves and fishes."

Science and knowledge must be applied to agriculture and production to yield the highest results.

Appreciation of Values The day was gone when businessmen thought that a university education was of no value in commercial pursuits, Sir Arthur said. It was the very qualities that made for success in business life, perception, accuracy, appreciation of values and honesty that the university sought to inculcate and develop. "What the world needs today is balance and a sense of poise, and it is knowledge properly applied that will restore the equilibrium."

"We do not need many universities in Canada," Sir Arthur stated, "but what we need must be strong. Education is the one thing in this country for which the people will never pay too much. Ignorance is the costliest thing in the world and the success of any nation is in direct proportion to the attention that is paid to its educational system."
