### Trustee Seeks Jaycee Support for Proposed Port Edward School

A Bruce Brown, school board trustee, last night outlined to members of the Prince Rupert Junior Chamber of Commerce reasons for the proposed construction of a new elementary school at Port Edward.

The \$167,960 construction by-law will be put before ratepayers of city and district at the Dec. 11 civic election.

Mr. Brown said that at the present time 84 pupils are being brought to city schools daily with transportation costs amounting to \$34 a day, while at the same time there is a space problem in the city schools as well.

Mr. Brown asked the Jaycees to support the by-law pointing out that the rural areas helped finance the new schools in the city. He said that soon the rural areas would be subsidizing the city schools because of their increased assessments.

Cost to the city of Prince Rupert would be \$3,000 a year for 20 years.

Tax increase would be half a mill.

Members joined the Kinsmen Club at meeting last night of seven new members of the current drive.

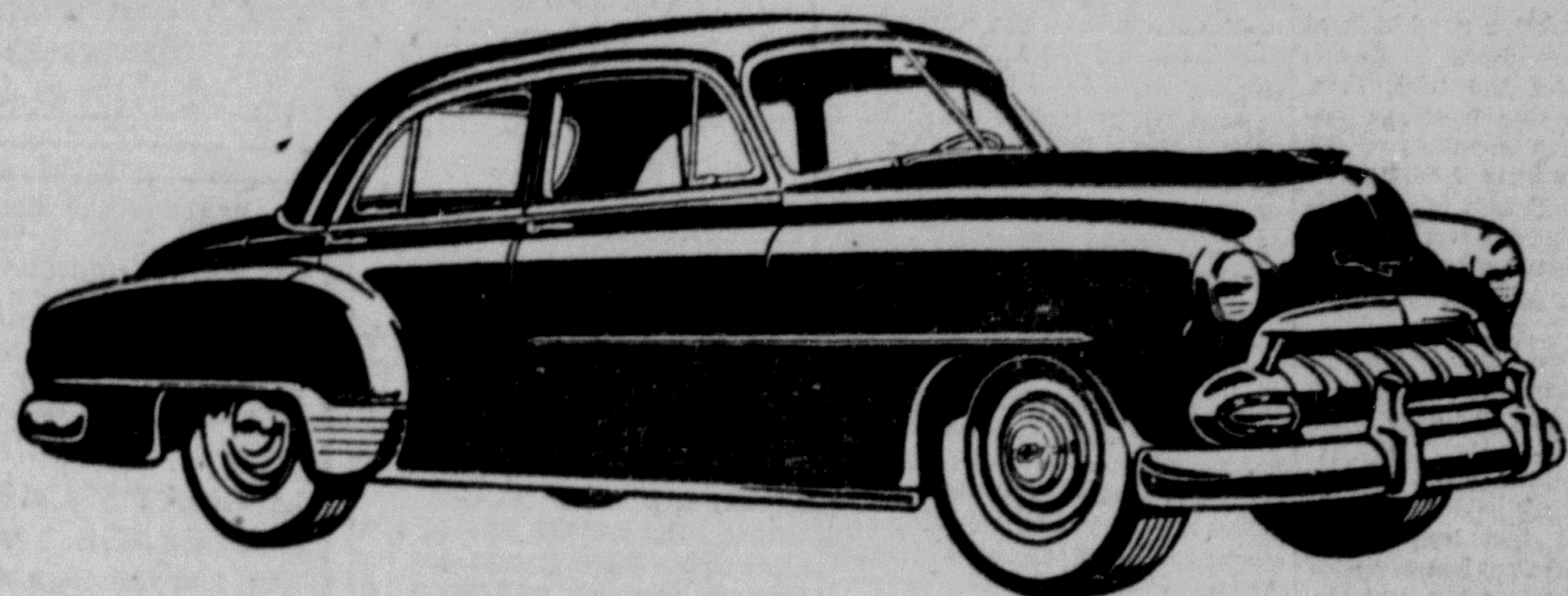
Members joining last night were Roy Paulsen, drug-store owner, Gordon Gorman and Dibb Printman of the Daily News.
