Mr. Champ's Sniping Puts Crimp in Partner's Game

Mr. Abel is not at his best when playing with Mr. Champion as a partner. The great man's constant criticism throws him off his game. He is either nervous or confused or both. This leads to the loss of thousands of points in the course of time. And of course it is understandable.

But here is a sidelight that is beyond understanding. As fine a technical player as Mr. Champion is, he seems unable to realize that his arrogance costs him, too.

Mrs. Keen led the jack of diamonds and dummy's queen won. Mr. Abel saw that he might lose three spades, a heart and a club. After some thought he banded down the ace and king of hearts. This good guess brought no comment from Mr. Champion. Only the bad plays rate his notice.

At trick four Mr. Abel led a club and finessed dummy's queen. Mr. Dale won with the king and was in no hurry to try to cash spade tricks. He merely returned a diamond which was won in the closed hand with the king.

Mr. Abel now cashed his other high diamond, discarding a small club from the board. He led to the ace of clubs and returned a small spade. Mrs. Keen killed the jack with the king and a spade return through dummy.

seller of the property, may find someone interested in buying such a mortgage immediately.

It also provides a place where the mortgage buyer may quickly sell it to someone else.

The exchange itself takes a commission of one per cent of the cash paid for the mortgage. The exchange classes the second mortgages A, B, C, D, with A having the least risk and D the most.

Take a \$4,000 class D high-risk mortgage, running three years at six per cent with payments of \$35 a month for principal and interest.

Class Ds are currently quoted at 55 per cent. Thus the buyer would get the \$4,000 for \$2,200. In three years at \$35 a month he would draw \$1,260 and then, at maturity, would get about \$3,247, the capital amount still remaining. So, in three years, he would get a total of \$4,687 for his \$2,200 investment, close to 38 per cent if averaged over the three years.

Actually, most yields are lower than this and at present are running about 10 per cent yearly for class A; 14 to 15 per cent for class B; 20 per cent for class C, and 25 to 30 per cent for class D.

up to Mr. Dale's ace-ten completed the set.
"What were you trying to do, make five, Abel?" sneered Mr. Champion. "Are you finesse-happy or something?"
Mr. Abel made no reply, as he already saw where he had gone wrong. His correct line of play after clearing the trump suit was to cash the ace and king of diamonds, discarding the deuce of clubs from dummy.

Next, lead a club and go right up with the ace. Return the queen of clubs and regardless of which opponent wins with the king, he will have to lead back a minor suit card, giving Mr. Abel a sluff and a ruff; or a spade, which automatically would make it impossible for Mr. Abel to lose three tricks in that suit.
