Film Council Moves Projectors, Library

The Prince Rupert Film Council has moved its library and projectors from the Civic Centre to the city fire hall for future storage, President E. A. Evans announced today.

This move was made to make films and projectors available for lending at all hours of the day; also to make it possible to return the equipment at any hour.

Mr. Evans also announced the council has received five new films for distribution. They are: Buck Cheezer, Eskimo Summer, Chinook's Children, Water, Friend or Enemy, and Life on the Western Marshes.

The Film Council was started in 1947 under its first president, Lance Potterton, former RCMP patrol sergeant here. For a start, a projector and screen were loaned to the council by the National Film Board which later were purchased with funds raised by membership fees, donations and entertainment.

Since that time, the council has purchased 10 films, including "Peoples of the Skeena," a picture of native people in the Skeena River area.

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
