Blind Chiropractor Celebrates 30th Successful Anniversary

WETASKIWIN, Alta. (CP)—Dr. B. L. Gullekson—blind since 10—is celebrating his 30th anniversary as a chiropractor.

Despite Dr. Gullekson's aversion to what he calls "unethical" publicity—capitalizing on his blindness—news of his ability and accomplishment has spread far.

Patients have come from British Columbia, Saskatchewan, the United States, and as far north as Yellowknife, N.W.T.

Dr. Gullekson was born near the village of Toronto, South Dakota. He was blinded at 10 by the explosion of a covered can in which he was boiling coffee.

The Gullekson family moved to Wetaskiwin in 1910. Mr. Gullekson was 21 when he entered a school for the blind at Montreal where he learned to read braille.

During the following three years he read books in braille on physiology and anatomy to prepare for entering a chiropractic school in Toronto.

On Nov. 9, 1922, young Dr. Gullekson arrived back at Wetaskiwin and set up his practice.

He has devised several ingenious instruments to help him in his work. One of them is a striking watch, made to his specifications. The watch strikes a light musical tinkle—every 30 seconds.

BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Shrewd Playing Can Throw Even Player Like Champion

Playing against players who are better than you are, it is sometimes winning practice to make bids, leads and plays which are out of the ordinary and which are inclined to put your opponents on the spot for a decision early in the hand.

In other words, if you play in a completely routine, text-book manner, your more skillful and more experienced opponents will probably out-play you in the long run. But even the great Mr. Champion, for example, cannot see through the backs of the cards and, if put to a guess early, is just as apt to guess wrong as anyone else.

Of course, every hand will not lend itself to this treatment and I am not recommending that you throw all caution to the winds and lead any card at random in the desperate hope that "something will happen." You've still got to pick your spots.

In today's hand it was Mr. Dale's opening lead. Before telling you his choice, look at Mr. Champion's prospects. He has to lose one heart and one club. If he can finesse successfully against the queen of spades, he has just one spade loser.

But Mr. Dale's opening was the ace of spades. He followed up with the deuce of spades—

and Mr. Champion had a hard decision to make at trick two. Is it common to lead the ace from an A Q 2 against a suit contract? I think you will agree, the answer is no. Mr. Champion knew it was possible, but he finally decided it wasn't probable. In any case, there was no way in the world for him to know for sure. He went up with dummy's king—and Mr. Abel showed out.

If Mr. Dale had opened a side suit, and if Mr. Champion had started spades himself, there is little question that he would have finessed against the queen.

And note that Mr. Dale took practically no chance by leading the ace of spades. If the king had not shown up on the board, he would have shifted, retaining the guarded queen for a certain winner later in the hand.
