Joe Davis Loops Winner In Dying Minutes of Game

GORDON & ANDERSON 40, MANSONS 38

A long, looping shot from well out of the key Saturday night gave victory to Gordon & Anderson over rival Mansons 40-38 in the regular senior "B" basketball game.

The winning shot, with both teams tied at 38-38, was loosed by Joe Davis, lanky fall-away expert whose shooting throughout the game had been only mediocre.

But his most sensational shot of the night came a split second too late to count as the final buzzer cut sharply through the Civic Centre gymnasium while the ball winged unerringly into

the bucket from behind the centre line.

Measured, that shot would have stretched some 50 feet.

On the whole, the game was mostly dull and tedious except for the last quarter after Mansons' third-frame rally took up the slack on an eight-point deficit for a lead of 26-25.

Mickey Webster came through for the jewellers with two sensational dashes and successful lay-ups after stealing the ball in the opposition court. Ray Spring, whose score of 13 was high for both teams, saw his long shots work only seldom and his usual fire was missing.

For the victors, Jim Flaten scored high with 12, but he, too, was in the mediocre class until the last pressure moments of the game when he turned master of the guard line to set up the winning plays.

Sev Dominato and Vern Clecone were referees, controlling a clean game but often not agreeing on each other's calls.

The hardware squad's win puts Alex Bill's team two points ahead in first place while losers, coached by player Don Hartwig, slip to a tie with Helge Holkestad's CCC pulp millers in second place.

In the Inter "A" division, North Stars defeated Fraser & Payne 53-44. However, Rod Tait for the vanquished racked up 16 points to lead the scoring for both squads. Letourneau, with 13 points, was high man for the winners.

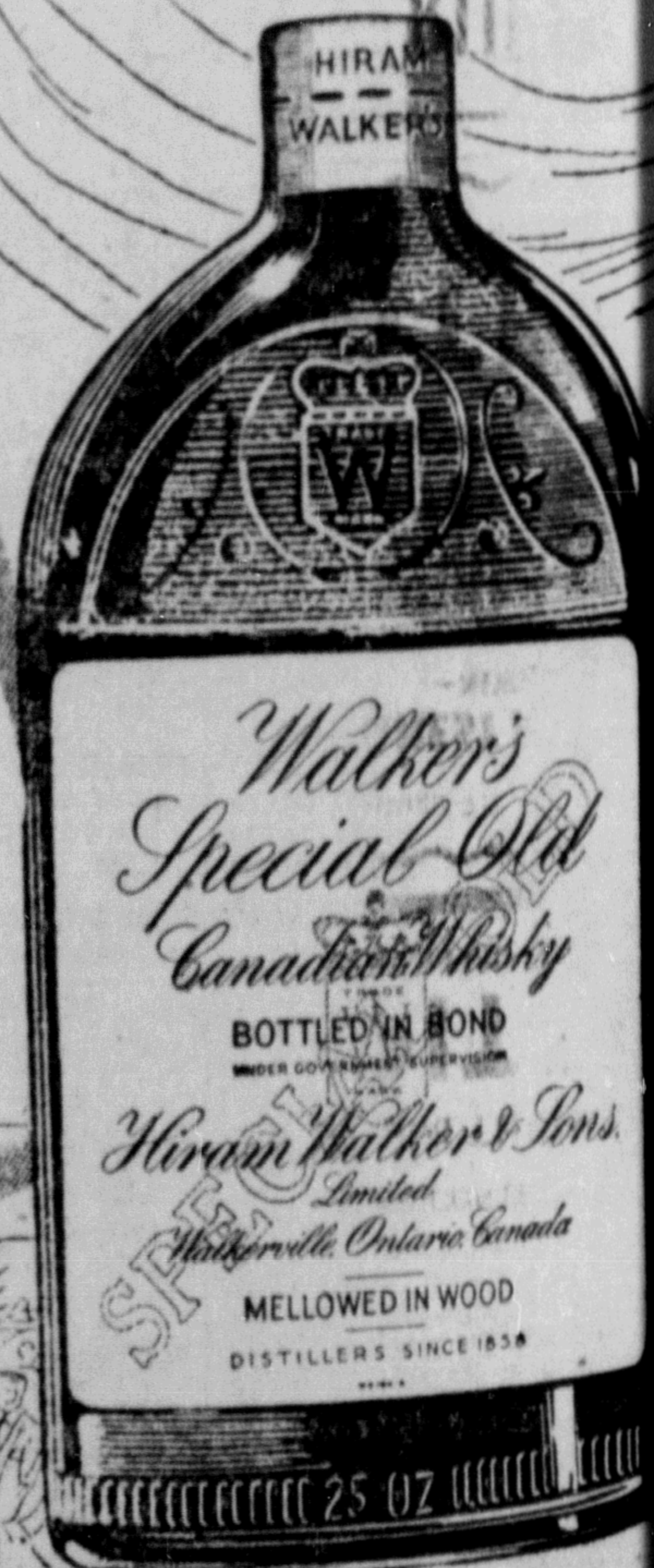
