of our enemy, free nations of the west got another chance.

LET US THINK of the meagre, miserable results of the recent Commonwealth conference in London. Sure, 'the mountain labored' and brought forth a mouse. The one hard announcement is that the British Prime Minister will soon again go, virtually hat in hand, asking for another handout from Uncle Sam—who more and more each day develops a "rich uncle" overlord complex. Yet he needs us as much as we need him.

Britain chafes at the fact that an American admiral commands her Atlantic fleet. Canada grumbles "off the record" because U.S. air forces land at our air bases without prior permission. An American senator hollers that Canadians are not doing enough in Korea.

So we free citizens of the democracies continue to waste our time by quarrelling or quibbling with each other.

SUPPOSE the free nations did what our own Canadian Senate suggested in the historic resolution passed, unnoticed, on the very eve of the Korean war. Suppose the nations now in NATO formed an outright federal union—to be expanded, step by step, Britain's economic problem would end overnight—for food would flow into Britain from this continent as naturally as it does between B.C. and Alberta or Ontario and Quebec.

There would be no petty arguments as to whose admiral would be boss—it would all be one navy. We would have in Canada a boom undreamed of in our rosiest visions. Even the otherwise insoluble problem of Germany would be solved—for a free democratic Germany would be eligible for membership and no longer a menace.

Muzzy Tries Steamroller With Dire Results

The successful defence of this hand required the delicate touch. Mr. Muzzy used steam-roller methods—and his side ended up with exactly three tricks.

Mr. Champion got off to the best opening, the singleton deuce of clubs. Mr. Muzzy won with the ace and wasted no time returning a club. While Mr. Champion ruffed this trick there was no way for him to re-enter his partner's hand to get another club ruff. Thus Mr. Abel made four-odd, losing only a club, a club ruff and the ace of hearts. He had plenty of time to take out the trumps and discard his two losing diamonds on dummy's good clubs.

This deal is another illustration of the extreme importance of the first lead made by the defending side after the opening lead.

Mr. Muzzy loves to ruff and to give his partner a ruff. In this case, however, it was necessary to look ahead and to realize that the club ruff had to be postponed.

If Mr. Masters had held the East hand, here is the way he would have reasoned:

"If my partner has as many as three trumps, he will get to ruff two club leads. But that is unlikely because it would leave Mr. Abel with a four card heart suit. With only four hearts, Mr. Abel probably would have bid three no trump rather than four hearts.

"If my partner has the ace of spades, he will always win with it. But, if he has the king of diamonds, that will require a lead through Mr. Abel's hand. One diamond winner, if any, must be set up while I still have control of trumps."

Undoubtedly, Mr. Masters would have reasoned further that his partner probably had two trumps, because if he had only one, Mr. Abel would hold six. In that case, Mr. Abel's probable rebid would have been in hearts instead of no trump.

As you see, the lead of a diamond at trick two sets the contract. Even if Mr. Abel should elect to go up with the ace and fire a high trump, Mr. Muzzy could win and lead a club. Mr. Champion would trump and lay down the king of diamonds.

Abbott May Submit Budget Early In '53

OTTAWA (C)—Canadians who may be wondering about the government's tax plans likely will learn their fate a few weeks earlier in 1953.

Finance Minister Abbott said he plans to bring down the 1953-54 budget "as early as possible."

He declined to name the date, but indications from other sources were that the budget likely will be brought down early in March. Usually the government's budgets are introduced to Parliament about the first week in April, but there have been March budgets before, mostly in the latter part of the month.

By introducing an early budget, the government hopes to shorten the session and get ready for coronation ceremonies in June.

Peace River Rail Link To Come Later

OTTAWA (C)—Prime Minister St. Laurent said Tuesday there will be railroads built into the Peace River country some day but indicated the government isn't giving it any thought now.

He was asked by reporters for comment on a statement by the Premiers of Alberta and British Columbia favoring extension of provincial boundaries northward into the Yukon and the Northwest Territories.

Premiers Manning and Bennett also agreed to make a joint submission to Ottawa urging construction of a 277-mile railway that would give the Peace River region a direct outlet to the Pacific Coast.

Mr. St. Laurent said he doesn't know anything about the proposed extension of provincial boundaries. As for railroad development, he said: "This is a growing country. There is no doubt there will be railroads into the Peace River district some day but it won't be now. We haven't given that any thought."
