



An Open Letter to the Electorate

Ladies and gentlemen.—There are a number of men who voted for prohibition previously and who at the forthcoming plebiscite intend voting for government sale and control. Frankly, I am a prohibitionist, but if there is a better way, and it would seem that these gentlemen have found a better way, else they would not seek to change their vote, I also will vote that way if, like them, I can find it.

Gentlemen, you voted prohibition last time, why have you changed your minds? Is it that prohibition has hindered development? The statistics, not only of this province but elsewhere, do not seem to support that view. Is it that crime has increased? Our closed jails and our criminal records are not on your side. And this also should be borne in mind that any legislation aimed what is in the hidden hand? Do to restrict evil and promote better conditions, i.e. factory acts, child labor, etc., has always been heavily disconcerted by those who previously had profited by rotten conditions.

Who has tried to increase crime? Not those who hitherto had walked decently in the eyes of the greatest number and of the world. Not many who have been convicted under this law if you can convince me of my white wings.

Is it that the mal-administration of justice where technicalities have defeated the spirit of the law? That has always been with us and always will be until our administrators prove worthy of the prominent position they hold.

Is it that the Prohibition law has not been enforced as you wanted it enforced? Surely you are more logical to blame the law when it has suffered from its non-enforcement. The blame rests upon weak mayors and police commissioners who are not concerned to enforce the law and policemen who are friendly to law breakers.

Is it that bootlegging has become prominent? There was no transgression until there was the law; but in voting for the alternative you fling open the door to bootlegging with a vengeance.

Is it that the Government Sale attracts you? Hardly that, for the governments which have tried it have given it up. You are being asked to take up a discredited and rejected thing which has been tried and proven a failure.

Is it that the alternative has the happy phrase, "Government Control"? Ah! that looks like a real prohibitory act after all—but what is this control? Do you know what it means? Has the Government told you? The Modern League tried to tell the Government how they would interpret it and the consequence was they had to withdraw their little outline—but it is not dead, merely waiting a more auspicious moment. What control can the Government have to once more fill its present empty jails?
