THE DEBATE IN OTTAWA

One of the most noticeable things in connection with the debate on the second reading of the Military Service Bill now before Parliament in Ottawa is the new line of cleavage which is being drawn across both the Liberal and Conservative parties, thus dividing the House altogether apart from previous party lines. Some of the prominent Liberals have indicated that they are in favor of the principle of the bill and also of the bill itself. Others, while agreeing with the principle of conscription, will not vote for this particular bill for the reason that it does not go far enough--that it is only conscription of man power and not of the equally necessary and as easily obtainable wealth of the nation.

So far is the Conservative party is concerned, the introduction of this conscription bill has detached from that unnatural alliance which the French Nationalists entered into with them, that party which has practically held the balance of power in Ottawa since 1911. The Frenchmen will have nothing to do with conscription. They broke with Sir Wilfrid Laurier over, his naval policy, and now they have broken with Sir Robert Borden over his military policy.

It dies not seem, however, that there is any likelyhood of the immediate putting into force of this bill which is causing so much argument and turmoil all over the country. The Conservative party is making all the capital they can over the necessity of more men being required for the front, even although they are enlisting at the rate of 7,000 or so per month, and at that, no recruits being accepted for artillery battalions. It is admitted that more men are required and will be required till there are no more casualties, and till wictory is finally accomplished. But this bill is to be put into force not on any specified date, nor after it passes, but only after the issuing of a proclamation. It was vaguely intimated by the Minister of Labor during his little contribution to this debate that even if this bill were passed, its enforce-

ment might be delayed. So that evidently the voluntary response to the Empire's call has not ceased to the extent that we might be led to believe, even away-gives mental ing" that Sir Sam Hughes hot days. Delicious spoke of.

It has been stated in the House of Commons by the Premier-and he said it in the negotiations for the coalition goernment-that he is willing that this bill should not go into force until after a general election. This may be taken to presage a general election soon but at the same time, it must be remembered that Sir Robert Borden himself proposed a resolution for a further extension of Parliament for another year-to the 7th day of October 1918. So that by taking these statements of the Premier's into consideration, the present Government has no immediate intention of enforcing conscription in the near future.

These considerations, of course, do away with the chief argument against the proposa of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, that the people be consulted on this matter, and that a referendum be taken.
