REBELLION IN THE SOUDAN QUELLED

London.—In May and November of last year communiquees were issued by the Secretary of the War Office announcing the defeat and finally the death of Ali Dinar, Sultan of Darfur, ruler of a Sultanate which formed one of the chain of autonomous kingdoms extending across the centre of Africa, of which Abyssinia is now the sole independent survival. The operations against Ali Dinar were consequent on a formal renunciation of his allegiance to the Soudan Government and a declaration of his adhesion to the cause of our enemies with whom he was already in close communication via the Senussi.

The final chapter of the campaign is now dealt with in a despatch from the High Commissioner for Egypt, covering a despatch from Major-General L. O. F. Stack acting Sirdar and Governor-General of the Soudan, relating to the military operations in Darfur from the occupation of the capital El Fasher to the conclusion of hostilities.

After dealing with abortive negotiations for the surrender of Ali Dinar, the writer details the operations which were undertaken for the final subjugation of the Sultan. He says:—Ali Dinar had fled towards Giuba, about 30 miles southwest of Kulme, where he was surprised at dawn on November 6. The surprise was complete. The enemy had not even taken the precaution of placing any outposts, and fire was opened unobserved on his camp at 500 yards range. The Sultan and his followers of some 40 or 50 rifles, thus rudely awakened, fled in every direction. Four enemy dead were picked up, and the dead body of the Sultan was found about one mile from camp, shot through the head. As the result of this dashing pursuit and attack there was no further opposition. By November 23 the remaining chief leaders had surrendered unconditionally.

The newly acquired province of Darfur, with the exception of the northwest corner, may now be said to be pacified. A strong patrol of Camel Corps, under Major T. B. Vandeleur, D.S.O., Royal Irish Regiment, has been despatched to this district to work in co-operation with our French allies. It is hoped that the presence of the Anglo-French forces will bring home to the lawless Guraan and Bedayat tribes who inhabit that portion of the country the necessity for curbing their propensities for brigandage, and have the effect of eventually bringing them under some sort of control.
