"No responsible Canadian turn as a possible premier would take office to enforce compulsory military service in the Dominion. Sir Robert Borden would not do it. Nor Sir Wilfrid Laurier. No man of eminence in either party would attempt what the recognized party leaders know and admit cannot be done. There are not less than three million people out of a total population of about eight millions in the Dominion who would resent flercely the application to the men of military age among them of a law compelling enlistment for service in a European war."

"Before there can be conscription in a democratic country there must be a social and military organization sufficiently perfected to direct and apply the forces thus brought into play and a public opinion all but unanimous as to the necessity for action so drastic. We have neither of these precedent conditions in Canada; nor is there the slightest likelyhood that we shall secure them before the close of the war."

"Here in Canada conscription is out of the question. Where there is a sentiment in favor of some such action—as in Toronto-it is not required; while in those sections in Canade where recruiting is at a minimum conscription could only be enforced if all the men recruited from the rest of Canada were put on the job.

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
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
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
