THE LIBERAL CONVENTION

In a few days, representatives of the western provinces of Canada will meet in convention in Winnipeg. Many matters of prime importance will certainly be discussed, and one result of this convention will doubtless be that the ideas of the western provinces on these matters will be crystallized and will be impinged upon the consciousness of the Liberals of the East. There will be divergence of views in some things but with the slogan raised in the East of "Win the War and win the election," there will be no divergence.

The four premiers of the western provinces will attend the convention and will be the first speakers addressing the gathering, and the great issues which are before the country will be gone into fully. "Certain Government newspapers," the Victoria Times says, "appear to think that the chief duty of the delegates to the convention to be held in Winnipeg is to pass a vote of confidence in Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues, including, we presume, the Hon. Robert Rogers. Some zealous operatives are known to be working ceaselessly to that end."

"The duty of the Western Liberals is to draw up a programme for the consecration of the country's full strength to the winning of the war," to recommend a policy which Canada must take to escape serious trouble and the application of which will demand strong, resolute leadership.

The assumption that this requirement can be met by passing a resolution advocating the conscription of man-power and doing nothing regarding those numerous essential services which are receiving prompt, radical attention in the United States, is as absurd as the expectation, held in some quarters, that the convention is going to advise Sir Robert Borden that it is eminently satisfied with the way things have been going and to keep on the same hopeless track.

"The Western Liberals, for the most part, are in favor of compulsory military service. William Sound had attained un-

They know the demand from the trenches should be met at once. But they will not stop at that, for pressing as it is, it is only one aspect of a much bigger situation. Most of them are from agricultural centres and they appreciate the need of prompt organized action to increase production and to bring about proper distribution. This is vital as a measure against the submarine campaign conducted by the Huns and a response to the frequent appeals which have come to Canada from England. They want the duty on tractors removed so that they can produce more cheaply and easily and thus help to meet the world emergency which they have been advised to expect. They want the profiteer drastically dealt with, not tickled with a powder-puff. They may press for adequate pensions and the solution of the returned soldier problem. They should demand that politics be kept out of the army. All these measures should have been adopted two years ago but, certainly they should be pressed for now. Canada has been conducting her part in the war on a limited liability basis long enough. The Western Liberals are in a position to force the pace, to sound a clarion call to real National Service, not the futile expedients which have taken the place of strong action so long whether in recruiting, which began to languish a year ago, or in other urgent problems crying for solution.

HEAVY RUN OF SALMON
IN ALASKAN WATERS

Reports reaching here indicate that the salmon run in Southeastern Alaska is one of the largest in years, and the pack of the Hawk Inlet, Hoonah and Funter Bay canneries will break all records. These canneries have each packed approximately 60,000 cases and the run of salmon continues enormous. All the canneries have scowloads of fish alongside the piers waiting to be handled, and the traps are reported full of salmon. The canneries are facing a scarcity of labor, and the race to "put in around the salmon" on Prince



FISHERMEN CONSCRIBED

Anyone who has the appearance of a fisherman or looks strong enough to pull a net is in danger of being put to work if he shows up in the vicinity of a cannery. There is no night in those latitudes and the men work almost continuously, sleeping at short intervals between tides while waiting to overhaul the gill nets. Several of the canneries expect to go over the 100,000 case mark, and the great Carlisle cannery at Cordova, which packed 125,000 cases last year, expects to get through with easily 200,000 before the present season is over.


