## PRINCE RUPERT WATERFRONT LEASES.

Sealed tenders for the purchase of leases of lots One (1), Two (2) and Five (5), Block F, in the City of Prince Rupert, will be received by the Minister of Lands, at Victoria, B. C., up to 12 o'clock, noon, on Monday, August 27th, 1917.

Tenders may cover one or more lots. Term of lease, 20 years.

Certified cheque covering six months' rental must accompany each tender, cheques of unsuccessful tenderer to be returned immediately.

The highest of any tender not necessarily accepted.

### Nothing From Laurier.

In Le Devoir of today Henri Bourassa, head of the Nationalists, contradicts the impression being circulated against Sir Wilfrid in the following words: "The French-Canadian people have little or nothing to expect from Sir Wilfrid Laurier, any more than from the Conservative Government on the whole and by declaration of its leader, the Liberal party is attached to the war policy to the very end. In the next place the association of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, anti-conscriptionist and Hon. Frank Oliver, more conscriptionist than the government, suffice to show how great is the illusion of those who blindly count upon the Liberal party for the salvation of the country."

Both Bourassa and Lavergne will be in the field against Sir Wilfrid at the next election.

### A Tory Scheme.

The prospect of an increased representation from the West at the next election and of an almost solid Quebec behind it on fiscal questions, was disquieting to the Conservative members and their friends, the big interests of Ontario. Something must be done to separate the two elements. What better than to create a cleavage between them on a question of loyalty to the British Empire. So the conscription measure was brought down, with what results are already evidenced.

### Issue of Lower Tariffs and Wider Markets.

Since then the first man to stand upon his feet in favor of free wheat and other lower tariff resolutions brought down by the Liberal opposition has been Sir Wilfrid, and the most solid support which the Western men have secured has been from the province of Quebec. Probably the greatest scare which the protectionist interest of Ontario have had since 1911 has been created through the Oliver-Carvell resolution moved in the house this session, which advocated tariff reforms almost approximate to, if not more sweeping than those contained in the reciprocity pact. The scare created by this resolution may be gauged by the fact that two of the Liberal members from Ontario, Messrs. Guthrie and Pardee, evinced fairly strong opposition to the resolution in the house. There was, however, no dissent among Liberals from Quebec or in the Maritime provinces.
