PLAYING THE GAME

Recently Canada had the spectacle of Sir Robert Borden reading the Nationalists of Quebec out of his party. The results of this remarkable proceeding will be regarded with a great deal of attention throughout the country. One reason for this scrutiny will be because, as The Times puts it, "there is hardly a rump of the Conservative party left in the Eastern province."

It shows that in the political campaign which culminated in the defeat of the Laurier Government in 1911, the Nationalists led by Bourassa and Lavergne, absorbed the Conservative party. The leader of the Conservatives, Mr. Monk, merged himself with the Borden Government. Continuing, The Times says that in fact all the members from Quebec who entered the Borden Government were Nationalists, nominated for the positions by Messrs. Bourassa and Lavergne. At least those two ebullient leaders claimed the honor of making the selections, and the assertion has never been denied. A huge campaign fund was collected for the campaign of 1911 from the "big interests" centered in Toronto. Their object was to kill reciprocity and to pave the way for the orgy of profiteering they expected to enjoy at the expense of the people of Canada, anticipations which have been more than realized by reason of the extraordinary opportunities afforded by the war. The Nationalists were given their share, full measure and running over, of that vast fund, whose treasurer has been handsomely rewarded for his labors and sacrifices with a peerage. Such is the history of the unique political game played by Sir Robert Borden—or more probably by the astute political schemers behind him—with the connivance of the leaders of the Quebec Nationalists, who have consistently attacked Sir Wilfrid Laurier as "too British for them."

But there is ground for a suspicion, concludes The Times, that the alliance between the Conservatives and the Nationalists is not at an end, notwithstanding the latest manoeuvre of the Premier. Lib-

eral candidates in Quebec in the last election invariably were opposed by Nationalist candidates. Will Sir Robert Borden prove the sincerity of his purpose by insisting upon Nationalist candidates being opposed in the coming elections by Conservative candidates? Will he supply convincing evidence of his sincerity by immediately bringing the conscription bill into effect and proceeding to enforce it for the purpose of supplying the needed reinforcements for the Canadian forces fighting in France and Flanders? If the Premier does not do these things, then there will be sufficient grounds for a suspicion that there is still an understanding between the Conservatives and Nationalists—that they are playing the old political game of the "big interests" represented by Sir Thomas White, the agent of Sir Joseph Flavelle, and the junta of profiteers whose bank balances have grown exceedingly fat at the expense of the people of Canada, and who are in a state of nervous prostration at the prospect of the so-called radical programme adopted in convention by the Liberals of the West becoming the platform of a new Government.

NOTES AND COMMENTS

The news that no more munitions are to be made in Canada must be taken to show that the authorities in Great Britain must have the production of the necessary war material very well in hand. When the present contracts are finally completed and transported across the Atlantic, there will be more cargo space available for foodstuffs and other necessary commodities.

Having duly taken notice of the straws which have been pointing the direction of the political wind for some considerable time past, the Hon. Robert Rogers has taken heed and got out of the cabinet of his own free will and accord—apparently—before the full storm bursts. The Hon. Minister of Elections always keeps his ear pretty close to the ground, and on this occasion, having cut loose from the Borden Government, he is neither in it nor of it. 


