THE C. N. R. DEAL

Strong expressions of indignation have arisen from all over the country regarding the deal which the Government of Canada intends making with MacKenzie and Mann in the taking over of the Canadian Northern Railway. Not only the deal itself is objected to, but the manner of the making it. The Edmonton Bulletin says that "the MacKenzie and Mann interests have succeeded in railroading through Parliament the most barefaced piece of thievery ever put over that route. They have adopted the win the war cry as their own, and under cover of patriotic professions, are plotting to perpetuate the reign of plunder they have employed during the last three years. Plainly, if the ordinary people of the country want to have anything left when the war is over, they had better stop calling each other names and begin to give some collective attention to the plans that are being laid to fleece them."

That is a very plain statement. "Thievery" means that there must be a thief or thieves. And thieves are usually put in prison. But when the alleged "thievery" is legalized by Act of Parliament, what are the people of Canada, whose property is being stolen, going to do about it? The Canadian people have had to stand for a lot up till now, and if they prefer it that way, well and good. They got what they voted for.

Baron Shaughnessy uses more delicate language in conveying the same idea. He says, in referring to this matter "It is to be hoped that the country will not in consequence be saddled with heavy liabilities heretofore undisclosed, and that in fixing the amount to be paid under the arbitration proceedings, no consideration whatever shall be given to personal investments in unfortunate ventures such as coal mines, lumber mills, blast furnaces, and other works alleged to have been undertaken for the of Canadian Northern enterprises, but being in fact private speculations of the promoters

of the railway company." Commenting upon this statement the Victoria Times says that "Baron Shaughnessy is voicing a vain hope. The measure which has just been forced through Parliament under closure is intended to do the very things the head of the C. P. R. fears. A weak Government, dominated by the Flavell-MacKenzie-Mann-Lash group, has unloaded upon this country undisclosed liabilities, the extent of which heaven and those interests alone know and has paved the way for the payment of millions by the taxpayers for the privilege of carrying the burden. It is a 'win the war' measure. It is going to hit kaiserism by soaking the Canadian taxpayers, who include, of course, the Canadian soldiers, and benefitting that small group of intensely loyal and patriotic interests behind the bill."

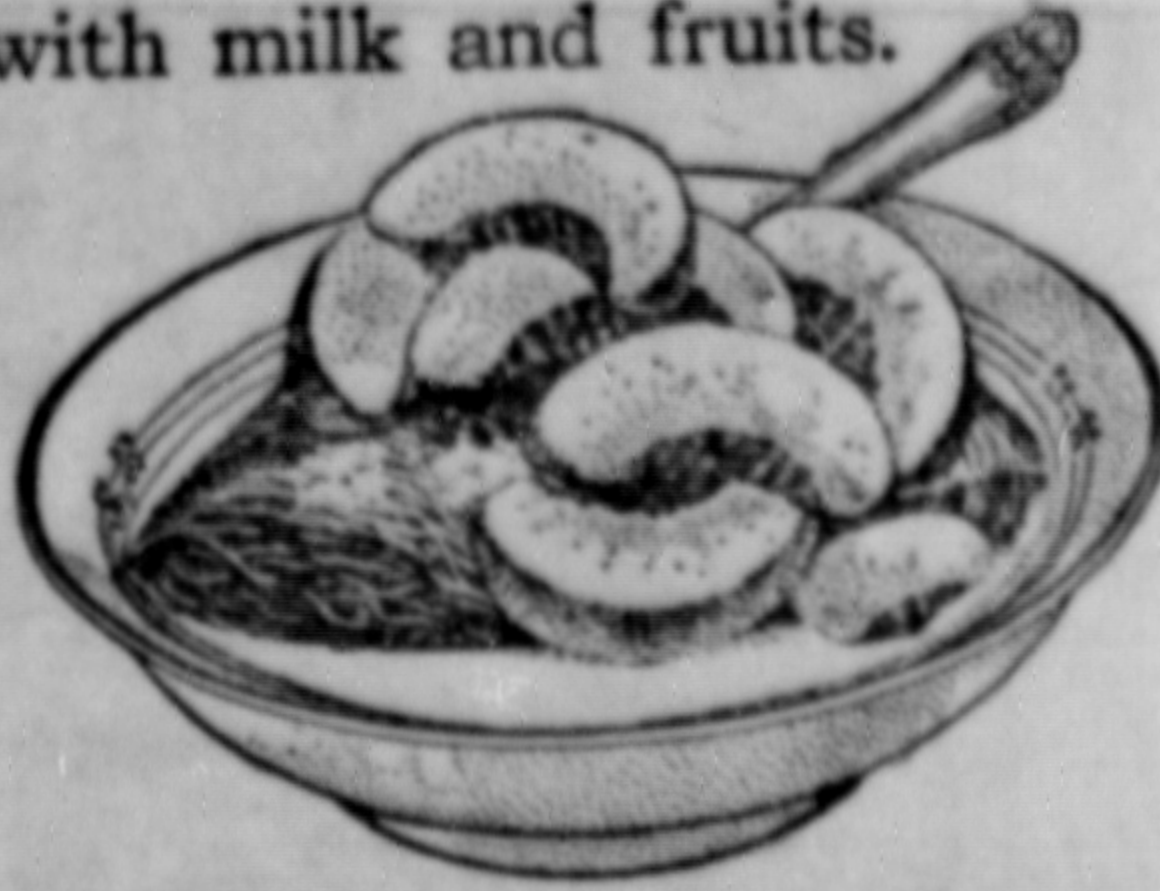
Referring to "The Canadian Northern Steal," the Sun says: "We call it steal advisably. It is worse. The application of the closure has made it robbery by violence."

The agreement entered into between the Government and the C. N. R. was that in the event of default, the Government was to foreclose. But the Government has no intention of foreclosing. It is going to buy and pay good Canadian money for that which no cash consideration was given. It proposes to buy watered stock to the extent of \$60,000,000.

The Drayton-Acworth report plainly says that "this stock was issued without any cash consideration." Worse than that it was worthless. Yet the Government of Canada, with Sir Robert Borden the premier, proposes to buy watered and worthless stock, not with their own money, but with the money of the people of Canada.

That is the kind of Government we have got, who look after the interests of the people as they swore to do. The manner in which they have looked after the interests of the people is quite enough to ensure a class of men with a somewhat higher standard of public morality being returned at the next general election.

According to Vorwaertz, the German newspaper which predicts the answer to Germany to the Pope's peace proposals, "The German people want no gain, but only a durable peace, guaranteed by international treaties." This is what the Entente nations believe too. But there is a distinct difference between what the German people want and what the Kaiser and his clique want. In Germany, the Kaiser does not stand for his people. He stands for himself and his family only.
