THE PEACE PROPOSALS

Never since the days of Gladstone's scathing speeches regarding the doings of the unspcakable Turk in their treatment of nations subject to them at that time has any Sovereign been the recipient of such an indictment as that contained in President Wilson's review of the Kaiser and his clique in their actions since the war began.

"We cannot take the word of the present rulers of Germany as a guarantee of anything that is to endure unless explicitly supported by such conclusive evidence of the will and purpose of the German people themselves as the other peoples in the world would be justified in accepting—without such guarantees, treaties of settlement, agreements for disarmament, covenants to set up arbitration in the place of force, territorial adjustments, reconstitution of small nations, if made with the German Government, no nation could depend on. We must await some new evidence of the purposes of the great peoples of the Central Powers. God grant it may be given soon and in a way to restore the confidence of all peoples everywhere in the faith of nations, and the possibility of a covenanted peace."

This attitude taken up by President Wilson is the only one that can reasonably be adopted by the Entente powers. Time and time again, have the present rulers of Germany shown that their pledged word is as naught. They regard their written and signed treaties as scraps of paper. Their word is worthless. Until such time as the German people as a whole are in a position to talk peace, the war with the rulers of Germany will go on.

Germany is still ruled by the Military caste. Democracy, the chief feature of our western civilization, has not found expression in Germany to any great extent as compared with her neighbors. The Kaiser and his bureaucratic advisers are still ruling Germany with a rod of iron. The hunger, discontent and unrest so prevalent throughout the Central Empires have not yet caused any relaxation of the stern discipline with which these countries are governed. The Kaiser is still the Kaiser and his law is law—in Germany.

In the eyes of the Allies, Hohenzollernism and Democracy are irreconcilable. The object of the war, in the words of President Wilson, is "to deliver the free peoples of the world from the menace and actual power of a great military establishment." Once the German people are freed from the thralldom of their military caste, they will be the gainers as a result of this great struggle. In freeing Europe and the whole world from the menace of military aggression, the Allies will afford an unexampled opportunity for the German people to assert their collective will. If they have any will, apart from that of their present rulers, left.

Freed from their insanity caused by their dreams of world power, it may be that the simple minded, kindly, deep thinking Germany of a hundred years ago may yet resume her place among the nations of the world.

operate it for themselves. This principle of collective ownership has been advocated for long enough, and if suitable arrangements can be made for the accomplishment of this experiment, the outcome will be watched with great interest.
