THE RIGHT TO VOTE

Sir Wilfrid Laurier, pointed out this week in the House of Commons in Ottawa that among the aliens affected by the "War Time Elections Act" now before the House, were many voters from Austria-Hungary, who sympathized with the Allies. This is an important distinction, which, a contemporary says, gives the measure a bearing upon the war that it is hard to imagine its promoters dreamed of.

The majority of immigrants from the Dual Monarchy in Canada are Slavs and other elements who came here to escape the tyranny of the Hapsburgs. They represent more than half the people of Austria-Hungary upon an uprising of whom more than upon anything else are centred the hopes of the Allies for the early termination of the war. Bohemia has been in revolt from the beginning of the struggle. The sympathies and activities of the inhabitants of the Italian provinces under Austrian rule require no definition. The Roumanians of Transylvania are, of course, pro-Ally. The Serbs, of Bosnia and Herzegovina, are the same.

The Canadian Government has furnished the ruling powers at Vienna with a weapon for combatting internal disintegration which they will be quick to utilize. The Bohemians who have a modified franchise in Austria-Hungary and are agitating for further privileges will be told that they are infinitely better off in that respect than their compatriots in Canada, who are not to be permitted to vote at all. It will be pointed out that while the Allies profess to be fighting for the self-governing of subject races in Austria-Hungary, none of them denies that right to the same people in its own country; that while they demand that Bohemia be given her autonomy Canada deprives Bohemians of the right to vote; that while the liberation of Bosnia and Herzegovina, Italia Iredenta and Transylvania is declared to be one of the objects of the war, the Canadian

Government will not allow the people of those provinces in its own country to exercise the franchise, although they had resided there in many cases for years, and came there on the express invitation of the Government.

Enemies of Canada undoubtedly should not be permitted to vote—they should be interned—but it is absurd to designate everybody who came from Austria or even Germany as an enemy of the state. Care should be taken that in readjusting the franchise this country does not commit an act of incredible folly which might stiffen the enemy's resistance and prolong the war more than anything else could. If the Central Governments are able to show those elements, now racially and socially hostile to them, that some of the Allied states are disfranchising their compatriots merely because of the place of their birth, they will nip in the bud the internal upheaval which, especially in Austria-Hungary, is now come to be regarded as the only hope of an early peace. Certainly, for reason of policy at least, we should cultivate the support of such elements in the Dual Monarchy as the Bohemians, Slavs and the Roumanians, instead of throwing them into the arms of their governments by treating all their countrymen in Canada as alien enemies because they happened to have been born in that polyglot domain. And we venture to say that if the Canadian Government were to ask the opinion of, say, Mr. Lloyd George or President Wilson or Premier Painleve on the subject they would emphatically declare that it should be dealt with in the most careful manner.
