"Kamared! Mercy!"—Remarkable Photo Made from French Trench. Surprised by an attack before dawn by dismounted French Cuirassiers at Laffaux, these Germans rushed out with their hands raised high over their heads shouting "Kamared, Mercy." This striking photograph was taken at four o'clock in the morning and the figures of the captive Boches are strongly silhouetted against the weak light on the early dawn. The attack was made by the French 9th Cuirassiers on foot.
