CHANGES ITS NAME TO ESCAPE THE PENALTY

The Same Old Gang Still run the Party Machine—"Province" Tells How it is Done.

The manner in which the Conservative party is taking great pains to camouflage itself in view of the coming election is stated with great frankness in the Province in the last issue to reach here. In some places the party machine would like to disguise itself under the name of the "Win the War" party. In Vancouver, they prefer to be known as "Unionists." Knowing that the name Conservative would get them nowhere, "Unionist" now means the same old crowd.

The Provincial Conservative Association at its meeting here yesterday decided not to call strictly Conservative primaries for nominating conventions in the province but to describe them as "Borden-Unionist" gatherings and to invite all voters in favor of the new administration to attend and aid in the selection of candidates. It is assumed by the association, however, that as no other section favoring Premier Borden has a definite election organization, the situation will remain in the hands of the Conservatives, now to be known as Unionists.

It is suggested by many Conservative leaders here that when the nominations are made in the three Greater Vancouver seats it will be found that the "Unionist" nominees will be men who for the past decade or so have been well-known as Conservatives.

South Vancouver Conservatives have already decided to hold an upon unionist primary and convention and likely the same course will be taken in Burrard and Vancouver Centre. In other words the old adage "a rose by any other name would smell as sweet" will still hold good. For convenience sake and in order to solidify the elements supporting Premier Borden, "Unionist" will replace "Conservative," but the Borden candidates in British Columbia will in practically all cases be men who were formerly Conservatives rather than men who were once Liberal and who dropped Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

South Vancouver Conservatives this week set an example which it is expected that most of the other organizations of the party, on the coast at least, will shortly follow. At a meeting this week by a vote of about nine to one of those in attendance the association decided to constitute itself a Union Government Association and virtually to drop its strict Conservative affiliations.

Medical Boards are Ready!

Medical Boards are now ready to examine all men who apply as to their physical fitness for military service. These boards are established throughout this district.

Upon examination, the medical board will classify each applicant according to his fitness; into Category A if he is fit for service in overseas fighting units; Category B if fit for service overseas in Army Medical Corps, Forestry Battalions, etc; Category C if fit for service in Canada only, etc.

Only men whose medical examination places them in Category A will be included amongst those required to join the colours in the first instance; the man placed in any other category will remain at home until men in the category to which he has been assigned are called to the colours. The men placed in Category A may still apply for exemption on any ground.

Men between the ages of 20 to 34 inclusive, who were unmarried or widowers without children on July 6th, 1917, are strongly advised to report before a Medical Board at once. This is the quickest and surest way for them to find out their status under the Act.

Parents and employers are also urged to have those in whose cases they are specially interested visit a Medical Board and undergo examination. The methods of examination are simple and will result in no discomfort or inconvenience.

Now is the time for employers to obtain facts of the greatest value to them in making their calculations. The Medical Boards will determine how many of their employees will be left at home for physical reasons and how many will be selected for service unless an application for exemption be made with success.
