The estimated saving will be \$1,200 per annum which is a considerable item. I ask you how long it would be until the four aldermen would * seek legislation enabling them to the Cadets in playing the salute. draw \$100 per month for their services. This would amount to |84,800 a pear as against the present \$2,400. This is a reasonable way to look at the matter. The city would lose the services of four men, equal in all respects to the other four, at an extra cost of \$2,400, which would appear to be poor business. Looking at the question from the point of view of democracy, for which the Allies are fighting today, such a policy is absurd. To reduce the number of representatives is a step backward.
