**USE SILK TO AVOID
BLOOD POISONING**

New York, Nov. 1.—The fact that troops of the Entente are wearing silk as a protective armor against blood poisoning from wounds, has partly accounted for the huge shipments of American silk fabrics abroad since the beginning of the war, in the opinion of silk trade authorities who have just returned to this country from France. The destination and use of this silk heretofore has been regarded as a trade mystery. It was learned early in the war, according to these authorities, that if soldiers wore silk next to their skin there was less danger from blood poisoning if the silk were driven into the wound than in the case of cotton or wollen fabrics. This discovery resulted in the manufacture of a special silk, prepared by a secret process, which is now generally used by the Allied armies.

Silk also was found to possess, when woven and prepared in a certain way, extraordinary resistance to certain German explosives. Powder bags and cartridge belts also are protected by a non-inflammable silk.

**GERMANS PREPARING
TO RETIRE FURTHER**

Move Great Hospital Behind Their Lines Miles to the Rear, Expecting Further Loss of Ground.

Amsterdam, November 1.—The Telegraaf here has received advices from the frontier which indicate that the Germans are evidently expecting to make another move to the rear in the immediate future. At Moorseele the Germans have maintained one of their greatest and largest hospitals. Its position close to the front has been a central one and casualties from both north and south have been concentrated there for attention. This hospital station has now been removed many miles rearwards to Waseghem. Previously stationed not far from Gheluvelt on the Courtrai-Dadessele tramway line, this hospital was most conveniently situated and thousands of wounded were treated here last year. The Flemish sisters have been obliged to follow the hospital to its new location at Waseghem for nursing service.

In the city of Bruges, every householder is compelled to keep a card displayed in the front window stating just how many men and officers can be quartered in the house, and the burghers must take care of the rooms allotted, and the billets must always be ready. The reserves behind the front, are numerous and measures were taken to have them conveyed quickly to Waseghem. With the Allies taking another mile of territory every day almost, the Germans are taking every precaution in the event of their line being pierced and a general retirement necessitated.


