holding the German forces six miles or so west of Udine. The Central Empires are still able to say that they have kept their lands inviolate from the invaders in Europe. The impotence of the Allies to invade Germany is given forth as proof of the invincibility of the German army. The presence of the Allied troops on any part of the enemy territory would bring home to the German people, who, true to their training, believe what a benign Government tells them, some doubt as to that invincibility. Their belief in the army and their Kaiser and his Government gone, the German people will do the rest.

WATER NOTICE

TAKE NOTICE that Dolly Varden Mines Company whose address is Alice Arm, B.C., will apply for a license to take and use ten cubic feet of water per second out of Trout Creek, a tributary of Kildare River flowing into Alice Arm, Cassiar District. The water will be diverted at the head of the Falls on the Silver Horde Mineral claim, Lot 3804, and will be used for power purposes on the Wolf and Dolly Varden Groups of Mineral Claims being Lots 3794 to 3797 inclusive, and Lots 3192 to 3197 inclusive and Lot 3854, Cassiar District.
