## UNION GOVERNMENT

Among the Liberal newspapers in British Columbia which have been strongly advocating for a Union Government, the Victoria Times has taken a first place. That already the doings of this alleged Union Government does not savor too sweetly in the nostrils of the Times is evidenced editorially in the last issue to reach here. Commenting upon the statement of Premier Brewster which was recently published, in which he states his position with regard to the coming election, and upon the other prominent Liberals who have joined the Union Government, the Times says:

It is very hard for these men to break with the chieftain they honor so much and of whose distinguished record they are justly proud, but in justice to their consciences and their conceptions of the needs of the country in its gravest emergency they could not adopt any other course. Had they been political opportunists merely they would have hedged and set their sails for the air waves of public sentiment. Instead, they have played the better part. They have shown their willingness to put their country above partisanship; to make sacrifices for the sake of national unity.

The readiness of prominent Liberals to put country above partisanship and to give the Union Government a trial, however, imposes upon Sir Robert Borden and his colleagues the obligation of showing a similar reception of political unity.

Being done in British Columbia, in this Province political manipulation is going on which represents anything but real unity. What sort of unity is denoted by an arrangement dictated by R. F. Green, under which eight Conservatives, four Liberals and one Independent are to be anointed of Ottawa? It was to this manoeuvring that Mr. Brewster alluded when he urged the Union Government to reflect the true spirit of unity in

the direction of its political interests in British Columbia and to divorce itself wholly from these associations which had brought the previous administration into disrepute here. If this is not done the Union Government as far as British Columbia is concerned will suffer in prestige and influence; and it will suffer at the polls in spite of all its advantages. Mr. Brewster's warning is timely and should be acted upon. Public opinion will not tolerate any topsided, cut-and-dried arrangement by a disguised political machine which outrages the spirit of that unity the country so urgently desires.

## WASHINGTON, D. C., IS NOW IN THE DRY BELT

Washington, October 31.—The lid was clamped down tight on the National Capital tonight at the stroke of twelve, when the Sheppard law, passed by Congress last winter, went into effect. After tonight there will be no more flaunting of sparkling champagne, cocktails or highballs in the Capital. That goes into the dead past.

After more than 100 years of openness, Washington became at midnight a "dry" city, and whoever gets his "nip" after today does it in his own way. Washington will not be "bone dry," for the Sheppard law allows the entry of wet goods into the town. It may be done by import from neighborhood communities, accompanied by an affidavit that the liquor is not to be used for an illegal purpose, or it may have already been provided by provision that has given a supply to underground cellar.

## SAYS PROFITS PUT BEFORE PATRIOTISM

Canada also needs many of these things—between the two it amounts to more than a million dollars a day in cash.

And the producers must be paid in cash.

Neither Canada nor Great Britain could go to a Canadian farmer and buy his wheat or his cattle on credit.

The farmer and all other producers might be ever so willing to give their country credit but they could not do it because they have to pay cash for wages,

for rent, materials, etc. They must be paid in cash, or its equivalent.

So Canada says to Great Britain:—"I will lend you the money so that you can pay cash to Canada's producers for what you want."

"I will borrow this money from our own people just as you borrow money from your people."

"I will also borrow from the people of Canada money to pay cash for all the products that Canada, as well as Great Britain, needs in Canada."

That is Canada's practical, patriotic part in helping to win the war.

Without this credit the Canadian producer could not sell to Great Britain, and without these Canadian products the war would be prolonged.

So it is necessary for Canada to give to Great Britain the credit in order that Canada's own producers, who need a market, will have one; and in order that Great Britain which needs the products to win the war, will get them.
