**ARRANGEMENTS FOR THE
ELECTION WELL IN HAND**

Ottawa, Nov. 14.—Progress is
being made by the officials in
charge of the arrangements for
the election. Enumeration of
voters has already begun in some
districts, although the work will
not become general for a few days.
There are a considerable number
of difficulties to be straightened
out, due largely to confusion aris-
ing out of the differences between
the provincial election laws and
the new Dominion election law,
which has been made applicable
to all the provinces.

There is a general impression
that it will be possible for Parlia-
ment to meet in January. As a
matter of fact, the earliest date
Parliament can meet is February
28, as the election writs are not
returnable until February 27.
Provision has been made for the
meeting of Parliament on Febru-
ary 28, but the date could be de-
ferred should the government find
it advisable to fix a later date.


