TO WIN THE WAR

"One of the most important contributions towards winning the war is to put a stop to profiteering on war supplies. The Government has deliberately encouraged profiteering for the benefit of its partisan! followers. A first duty would; be to secure to the country, which pays for the war supplies, the excess of profits being realized by the profiteers. I would not hesitate, in order to stop profiteering, to take control of the factories which are engaged in the supply of war materials, as has been done in Great Britain, and run them on the principle of a reasonable return on investment for the owners, and a reasonable legitimate profit. I believe that one of the best methods of providing war supplies and of saving the country from being exploited by profiteers would be to turn the Government shops, which are suitable for such purposes, to the production of war materials, ships, etc., for the benefit of the country at cost price."

These are the words of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and this policy forms part of his programme for the winning of the war. The people of Canada are being exhorted by the Government to save all they can to help to win the war. Silver bullets in the shape of dollars are required to beat the Germans. These silver bullets can be used by the civilians in Canada in fighting the Germans.

But at the same time as this Government is so anxious for the individual people in the Dominion to save, it itself has done little in the war of saving the large profits for the State. This Government in fact says! to the people of Canada: "Don't do as I do, but do as I tell you." Instead of putting the national shops into operation and turning out war supplies at cost price, the Government liked better to lease such plants to private interests for the purpose of turning out war supplies at a profit.

If the people of Canada really wish to get from under the burden which the profiteer is so diligently hitching on to their shoulders, they will, upon considering things as they are, take good care that Sir Robert Borden and his profiteering friends no longer have the power to encourage profiteering. The greatest of all these is Sir Joseph Flavelle, the man who in the space of three years took a personal profit of \$1,-634,000 This is apart from the profits of the William Davis Company altogether, and is what Sir Joseph pulls down himself. The continuance of Sir Robert Borden in office will in all likelihood see the continuence of this theft of the people's money. By keeping the Borden crowd at Ottawa, there is no reason to believe that the profiteer will be any the more fairly dealt with, and the ordinary people have, judging by past experiences, little to look for in the way of a reduction in the high cost of living. It takes every cent the working people can earn to get along with, and some of us don't get along either, too well. If Sir Robert Borden is not an accomplice in this profiteering, by continuing to permit it to go on, he becomes an accessory after the fact, and to that extent is guilty before the people.
