cheaper he can buy, and the  
cheaper he can sell. That is one  
sure thing. Then select a mayor  
and aldermen pledged not only to  
protect your rights in Cow Bay,  
but to vote say \$10,000 for dredg-  
ing it right up to Third Avenue  
and then to force the railway  
company to enlarge the opening  
and put in a swing bridge. The  
latter will be easy, as you will  
have the Dominion Government  
behind you. The saving of the  
expense of enlarging the entrance  
and putting in the swing bridge  
is one of the leading things the  
railway is fighting for, and ranks  
next in importance to the posses-  
sion of Cow Bay itself and the  
valuable waterfront on Third Ave.  
which the citizens would then en-  
joy.

Having this waterfront on Third  
Avenue scows laden with coal and  
building materials could be towed  
right up to the dock to be built  
there, which would make both  
those commodities cheaper to the  
consumer. The transportation  
firms will necessarily vote for the  
retention of Cow Bay, as it is the  
easiest grade in the city to haul  
from.

Therefore, is there any class of  
voter who will not be benefitted  
by the retention of Cow Bay and  
the vastly increasing volume of  
business that must immediately  
follow its improvement?

Now for the other side. What  
is there to say for it? Where  
would all this trade of the fishing  
boats go to when Cow Bay is filled  
in? To Ketchikan, or some other  
place far away, where inducements  
are held out for the fishermen to  
go and sell their catches, have  
their boats repaired and buy all  
their supplies, and probably their  
homes there. Think of it.

But the railway will give the  
city a real waterfront in exchange.  
Yes. And how is the public to  
get to its public dock, after spend-  
ing thousands to build it, across  
sixteen lines of shunting freight  
cars? Think it over.—W. Coyne.
