Montreal, Nov. 30 .- By reason of a change in the King's Regulations through an Order-in-Council at Ottawa, officers and soldiers will now be able to attend political meetings. Major - General E. A. Wilson yesterday received a letter from Coy C. S. McInnes, the Deputy Adjutant-General, informing him of this change.

Hitherto the King's Regulations prohibited any officer or soldier instituting or taking part in any meetings, demonstrations or processions for party or political purposes in barracks, quarters, camps or their vicinity and under no circumstances could either attend such meetings wherever held
