SELF INTEREST

In its advertising campaign for the Victory Loan, in addition to the patriotic duty which, it was pointed out, was fulfilled in subscribing for these bonds, a direct appeal was made to the self interest of the people. In addition to their duty to Canada the subscribers were doing a duty by themselves in taking these bonds, because of the security offered and the comparatively high rate of interest. Patriotism, combined with self interest made an irresistible appeal to Canadians of all classes. The one without the other, or each singly would not have attained to half the volume.

In this forthcoming Dominion election, the same situation exists. It is the patriotic duty of Canadians and to the self interest of the people of the district of Skeena to do their part in keeping the Borden Government from again being returned to power at Ottawa. The patriotism of the Borden Government has existed in the permission of abuses, which the people have cried out against, but in vain. Partisanship has run hand in hand with profiteering since the Borden Government took office. There have been graft scandals, and possibly will be more graft scandals. The greatest of all profiteers, the chief apostle, is Sir Joseph Flavelle, and he is still high in the confidence of Sir Robert Borden and his followers. Flavelle and big profits look good to Borden.

In the vital matter of the people's food, the Borden Government have looked on when the people were being exploited. As a sop to the public, they appointed a food controller. But no one has seen any evidence of his activities in the way of a downward trend of prices. A controller who cannot control is not much use. The patriotic Borden Government doing their best for their country (?) have permitted a state of things to arise in Canada which is without equal anywhere at this time. Even in Great Britain, where the "vested interests" are if possible more strongly entrenched

than anywhere else, they have food controllers, and other controllers, who live up to their names.

But the patriotic duty of the Borden Government is to do the best they can for themselves and their friends so long as they can. The last act before Parliament dissolved was to railroad through the house legal authority for their friends to loot the public treasury for as much as \$10,000,000, for the worthless stock of the C. N. R.

The patriotic duty of the voters is to see to it that the Borden government, even disguised by a new name, as Unionists, do not again have an opportunity of robbing the people of Canada. And in the matter of the self interest, as well as in the interests of the city of Prince Rupert and the district, and of the Empire, it is the duty of the voters to see to it that a government returns to Ottawa who will do something to instill life into the dead plant at Hays Creek. The Borden Government has had the opportunity for the last three years of having orders placed with the drydock plant for war materials and munitions, but this they would not do. They evidently have a prejudice against any project set out by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and the Liberals. The National Transcontinental Railway with Prince Rupert as its western terminus was the project of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and judging from the treatment this project has received since the Borden Government attained to power at Ottawa six years ago, the same treatment may be looked for should they by any chance get back again.

Patriotism and self interest made an irresistible appeal to the subscribers for the Victory Loan, and these same principles are none the less effective in demanding that Sir Wilfrid Laurier be returned as Premier. Borden has done nothing for Prince Rupert. Laurier has done everything. He put it on the map, and it will require him to keep it there. Borden has not utilized the whole resources of the country for the winning of the war. That is

THE SOUND OF GUNS
ON THE FIRING LINE

It was early morning in mid-winter and the draft marched away from the rest-camp on the hill overlooking the sea and made its journey to the station, the men singing as they marched. The trucks were already waiting, an endless number there seemed, lined up in a siding with an engine in front and another in rear, and the notice "Hommes 40, Chevaux 20," in white lettering on every door. The night before the men had slept in a bell-tent where a man's head pointed to each seam in the canvas, but tonight it seemed that they would sleep if that were possible, in a rather more crowded place. But a much desired relief came before the train started; space wagons were shunted on and a number of men were taken from each coach and given room elsewhere. In fact when the train moved off Fred Roman, newly out, found that only eighteen soldiers, in addition to himself, occupied the apartment. Quite enough though, when equipments, packs, rifles and bayonets, savaresses, overcoats and sheepskin tunics were taken into account.

A bale of hay bound with wires was given to the men for bedding, and bully-beef, biscuits, bread and cheese were served out as rations. At some point on the journey it was rumored that the men would get a hot meal and a lot of rum.

At noon they set off on their journey to the trenches, a gay party that found expression for its vitality in song. The sliding doors and the windows were open and the men who were not looking out of the one were peering through the other. To a number (youths of nineteen these were) France was a new country, a place far away in peace and a favorite resort of the wealthy, but now a land that called to any man, no matter how poor, if he were strong in person and willing to give his life away if called upon to do so. But others of the draft were men who had already known war on the Somme, in Gallipoli, at Mons and a dozen other places whither the duties of their service had called them.

Rifleman Roman, newly out on the most momentous journey of his life, felt full of a strange thrill and excitement; the curtain which surrounded his previous existence was being lifted and he stood on the threshold of great adventures and wonderful exploits.

He looked out at the cottagers who labored by their humble and saw them stand idly for a moment and watch the train go (Continued on page three.)
