POLITICS

The Hon. Geo. P. Graham recently declared that the Borden Government had not lived up to its pledges in the matter of the Military Service Act. When he voted for the act during the last session of Parliament, he took the word of the Premier at its face value. When the Premier, Sir Robert Borden, said that the time was practically the essence of this Military Service Act, Mr. Graham believed him. Mr. Graham is not so sure now that there was such a great hurry as Sir Robert Borden made out to be, judging from the manner in which the Military Service Act has been put into effect. Mr. Graham believed what the Prime Minister, said at that time, and pays a tribute to Sir Robert's personal rectitude by saying that he would believe him again, if he said it. But the fact remains, that apparently by the way the provisions of the act have been carried out, there is no immediate hurry.

So far as winning the war is concerned, there is no immediate hurry, for one hundred thousand men is a negligible fraction among five millions. "If one is to judge by the speeches of the prime minister and the minister of militia," said Mr. Graham, "they are both less anxious to get men to the trenches than to get Tory votes in ballot boxes."

The Hon. Mr. Graham, be it remembered, is not a candidate in this election. He is not speaking for his own particular electoral interests. He speaks of the matters as he finds them. And it will be noticed that he says "Tory" votes!

The fact remains, however, that the Premier got the Liberal members of the late House to vote for the Military Service Act because of time being so important. This the events have disproved.

It is more apparent now than ever that this Military Service Bill was introduced at the particular time it was, without the people of the Dominion being prepared for it in any way, to

make an election issue. Sir Robert Borden and his Tory friends unblushingly say it is. It is just a repetition of the tactics employed six years ago. In order to cover up its sins of omission and of commission — knowing that as plain Conservatives their record was bad and that the electors would have none of them, the Bordenites change their name and now are strong for union. But the record of the Borden Government stands. It would suit Sir Robert Borden and his benchmen fine if the voters were to consider that all past and done with. But unfortunately, some people have long memories. And a particularly good memory is not required either. The high cost of living is always with us. The people are not allowed to forget the profiteering friends of Sir Robert Borden. Nor will they readily forget that one of the last acts of the recent session of Parliament was to agree to pay up to \$10,000,000 for C. N. R. stock, which the Government owned already and which its own commission declared to be worthless. The people have not forgotten how free speech was strangled in Parliament during the discussion of this nefarious bill by the application of the closure. Nor have they forgotten the graft scandals appertaining to everything in connection with war supplies.

But Sir Robert Borden would prefer to have all this forgotten. He would like to start with a clean sheet. So that he and his friends could start in and carry out all his schemes, which the refusal of an extension of the life of parliament denied him. But the voters will not stand for any repetition. Once bit, twice shy.

their responsibilities in this regard.
The Vancouver Province publishes the result of an interview with Major Taylor, director of aeronautics, who represents the Imperial Munitions Board, and our member, the Hon. T. D. Pattullo, minister of lands, and states that the Imperial Munitions Board is willing to purchase thirty million feet of aeroplane spruce lumber per month. These figures seem remarkably high. It is doubtful if up to date British Columbians furnished that amount of aeroplane spruce altogether, and if the Munitions Board expects to get anything like this quantity, it will have to plan to finance this new logging industry during the early stages. It will also have to assist them to get donkey engines, wire rope, provide tugs, and take immediate steps to see that none of the skilled logging labor is conscripted. It would be idle for the government of Canada, which is largely responsible for the Imperial Munitions Board, to say it wanted thirty million feet of aeroplane spruce per month and at the same time remove from the country the men upon whom it must depend to deliver the logs.

In passing, we might call Major Taylor's attention to the fact that this spruce industry belongs largely to Northern British Columbia. The Almighty for reasons of His own, placed this timber here and it has been the men of Northern British Columbia who have pioneered in this industry and have literally dragged it forward to the attention of the authorities. It is largely due to their efforts that this development will take its proper place as the most important of all war industries, for experts claim that the war will be won in the air.

The people of Northern British Columbia, as the pioneers it is hoped will be accorded favorable consideration at the hands of Major Taylor, when he comes to allot logging locations, and to arrange for saw-mill work incidental to the opening up of the industry upon a large scale. Prince Rupert has been isolated from all other war industries. This is one which by right belongs to us, as far as our capacity extends, and to that extent, the people of this northern country should have the right of way. There is no doubt that Major Taylor, possessed of the British spirit of fair play, will see that these pioneers get due consideration.

Prince Rupert being the logical centre for this industry, Major Taylor will doubtless visit Prince Rupert and take up his headquarters here.
