IN THE LETTER BOX

Dear Editor,—Will you kindly allow me space in your paper to make the following statement:
It has come to my knowledge that an effort I trust through ignorance is being made to boycott my business on account of my being a Frenchman. I regret having to take steps which might be construed as an effort to blow one's own horn, but desperate diseases require desperate remedies, and when an effort is made to ruin one's business the situation from his standpoint becomes desperate. I have had a son serving with the colors for almost two years. My other son volunteered and was turned down, but will probably be accepted in the present examinations. I might be excused if I were to apply for exemption for him (which I am not doing) in view of the fact that I have reached an age where it is all I can do to handle one man's work instead of two as I am today on account of being unable to get help. He was on the verge of coming here when the present Military Service Act came into force.

That I happen to be fortunate enough to have a son participating in this great fight for Freedom is a source of gratification to me, but I do not wish to be understood as looking for any special consideration on this account, but do ask for myself and all others whether they are actually represented in this war or not, what we all cherish so fondly "British Fair Play." I have no apology to offer for my nationality or the part I am playing in this war. Thanking you, Mr. Editor, and trusting that this will act as a warning to those who are so ready to vilify their neighbors, I am Truly yours,

the overseas crush. They've shown what they can do, and there's no denying they've done it well; and I will say that they've got credit for it. When you think of all that the English fellows have done without any noise about it in the press, it makes you think that we get more than our share of praise. I tell you what it is, though. The English people are taken with the idea of us fellows coming all that way to fight—and it is kind of romantic when you come to look at it—and they can't see the romance that's under their noses. It's always the way. People seldom see that their own brothers are worth while putting into a book—they're 'only old Jim' or 'old Harry,' that's all, nothing particular about them. "I once saw a couple of fellows have a scrap. One of them took off his jacket and rolled up his sleeves—very impressive, just like a book. The other chap got rather white at that, but he just buttoned up his coat and stood quiet and square. He won, though the other fellow was the best scrapper. I always think of that chap when I see the English troops—only, they can scrap, none better."

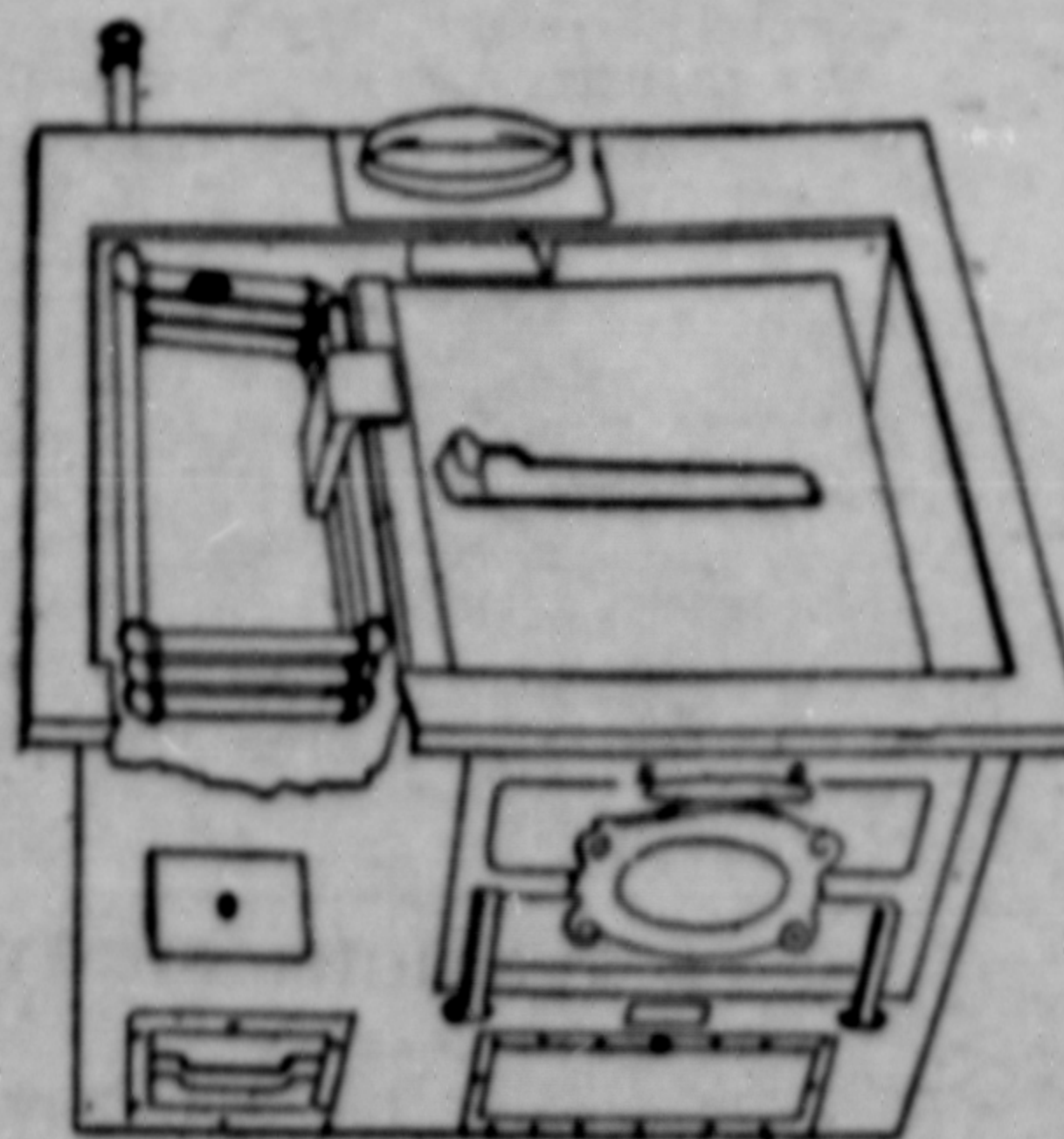
