SAYS CONSCRIPTION ONLY ELECTION CRY

Vancouver, Dec. 11.—"There is no intention of having conscription in Canada and there never was," declared F. C. Wade, K. C., in an address on the political situation before members of the Progressive Liberal Association. "Conscription is nothing but an election cry, a new one, a loud one and a fierce one. Every one who does not believe in conscription now is a traitor. A few months ago when Borden was in Vancouver and would not listen to a deputation that advocated conscription there was no talk of traitor then because Borden did not believe in conscription."

It was only when the cry could be raised against the Liberal party that any such cry as that was raised and it has come like a thief in the night, Mr. Wade said. As soon as the election was over on December 17 they would hear nothing further about conscription. It would have the same fate as national service, after all the hullabaloo that had been made about it. National service had no sooner been attempted than it had been discarded, because the labor element was against it. The only good effect it had was to drive Director R. B. Bennett out of public life, which the speaker considered, was something to be desired.

Nothing About Wealth.

There was one thing the government was saying much about and there was another it was saying nothing about. They said the only issue was conscription, but they said very little about the conscription of wealth. It was one thing to cry for conscription of blood but when it came to conscription of wealth it was treading on very delicate corns.

After having outlined the policy which had been adopted in England and South Africa, Mr. Wade mentioned that Australia, with only slightly over half the population of Canada, had sent five divisions to the front and was maintaining them as against the four divisions sent by Canada, yet the commonwealth had refused to adopt conscription. The reason that the voluntary system had failed in Canada was because of the interference of Sir Robert Borden and the members of his government with Sir Sam Hughes when the big financial interests told the prime minister that their industries were suffering.

Mr. Wade devoted considerable time to explaining the attitude of Sir Robert Borden towards Quebec and ridiculed the statement of Sir Robert that he would have nothing further to do with the Nationalists there. It was rather late in the day, Mr. Wade said, for Sir Robert to accuse the Nationalists of Quebec with disloyalty after he had taken seven members of that body into his government and given them big billets—seven men who had talked about shooting holes in the flag.

Emphasis was laid on the fact that at the time the government had introduced conscription of flesh and blood it had dropped conscription of wealth owing to the pressure of big interests, and the speaker quoted figures indicating the difference between what had been done in England with what was being done in Canada in this respect.

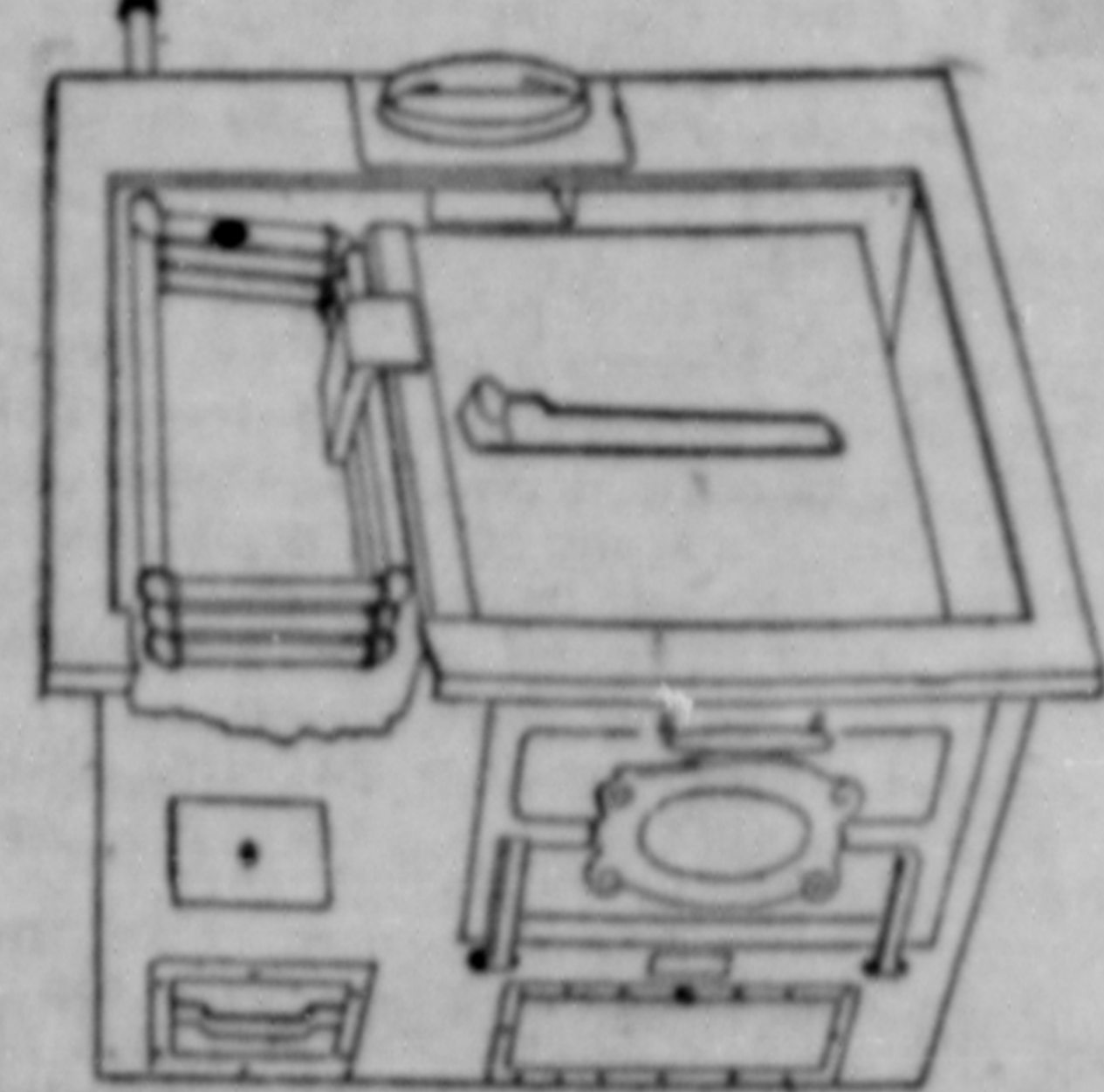
