**THE ELECTION**

The tremendous and enthusiastic receptions which are being accorded to Sir Wilfrid Laurier in his progress across the continent speak eloquently of the manner in which he is regarded particularly in the western provinces. Winnipeg, Regina and Calgary have risen en masse to do him honor, which will be further continued on Monday at the polls. Some time ago, the Ontario Tories sent an S. O. S. message to the west that Ontario depended upon them to return the Borden candidates to give the Tories a majority, as things looked then and still look very poor for the Borden government in Ontario. The West replies by giving the Liberal leader such a reception on his arrival that must give the Tories furiously to think. The people of Western Canada know full well just what they have to thank Sir Wilfrid for, and they are also painfully aware that to Borden they owe no thanks at all.

The people in Prince Rupert are in the same position. The very existence of Prince Rupert is the result of his far-sighted policy, which the Borden government have done their best to nullify. What can the Borden government turn round to and show to the Prince Rupert people that is their handiwork, other than the sinking of thousands of dollars in a hole in the ground, alleged to be for a post office site. There is nothing!

The supporters of the Borden government have not one argument to put forward for their return to power, except their tremendous desire to rush reinforcements to the front, when there is not a vessel available to take them there. Every allied transport available is engaged in shipping the millions of already trained troops from the United States. The great cry that comes from Great Britain is for ships, ships and more ships. The new tonnage they are able to turn out over there is only now within appreciable distance of the tonnage losses.

The local Tories now come

out with the argument that Prince Rupert cannot build ships and that all efforts to get the drydock going were foiled by the failure to get steel. They advertised yesterday in our columns a letter from Mr. E. J. Chamberlin, late president of the G. T. P. to this effect. In this connection it is worth while to notice that Mr. Chamberlin is no longer an official of the G. T. P. This argument of course applies with equal force to the building of wooden ships, as is being done in the southern cities. Because steel cannot be got, the Prince Rupert plant cannot be utilized to build wooden ships. That's some argument.

They put forward Mr. Chamberlin's naive statement that the government have no more jurisdiction over the drydock plant which belongs to the G. T. P. Development Co., than they have over any other manufacturing plant upon the B. C. coast. If the Borden government have no jurisdiction over the resources of the Dominion, particularly in war time, then all that can be said is that it is high time that a government were in Ottawa that would take some jurisdiction.

The Borden government took the power unto themselves to pay away to their own friends who held the "worthless" stock of the C. N. R. anything up to \$10,000,000. That was not for the development of the resources of Canada, nor to help in winning the war. That was just a plain steal of the people's money—some more graft for their friends. Of course, this was legalized by act of parliament, by the suppression of all discussion. It is law.

If the Borden government could steal \$10,000,000 for their friends, they could spend less than that legitimately for the operation of the resources of Prince Rupert—if they liked. If they had no jurisdiction over the idle drydock, in parliament is the place to get it. But no. They know that Prince Rupert is a Laurier town, and the furtherance of any project of Laurier's is the last thing the Borden government would do.

Just remember the drydock,



and vote for Stork and Laurier, and the progress of Prince Rupert.
