**CAPT. SIMS SAYS PACIFIC HERRING IS SOME FISH**

Refuge Bay, Porcher Island, December 11th, 1917.

Editor Daily News:—Sir—Permit me space in your paper to express a few thoughts regarding the development of the herring industry in these waters. Being out of town for the most part, I am unable to be present at the fishermen's meetings, and as I have had long experience in herring fishing, I feel I would be only doing my duty at this time to give my services to the public, through the press.

The herring fishery if worked and developed on a proper basis would put the fishing industry in these waters fifty years ahead. At present the herring fishing is a farce, to say the least. We use the seine method to catch herring and by this means we catch merely the "scum" of the fish. The seine method should be done away with, and the herring gill net put in its place. By the latter method we would catch the superior herring which is never caught at all. Just imagine us with this "scum" herring trying to compete with the herrings of other coasts—absurd.

The herring caught at present is not even good for bait, except it is immediately used. The gill net method is the only one, and this method only should be used if we are going seriously to develop this important branch of fishing, at which thousands of fishermen are engaged in the old country, and I have no fear in saying that we have here as good herring (if not better) only we have not caught them yet, commercially, and cannot with our present system.

The use of the gill net would open up the coast for 500 miles and besides catching herring for bait, we could have canned, bloaters, kippers and freshing—an industry in itself.

Private enterprise has done much for the fishing industry, but this industry of which I speak, is for the government to start, and start it they should. Why should not the government do for the people here what the Home Government did for the fishermen of the South of Ireland. The British Government to develop the herring industry in Irish waters sent experienced Scotch fishermen with boats and gear to Irish waters. The first year the Irish fishermen were taught to know the seasons of the herring, etc., the second year less Scotchmen came, and the third year we had a whole fleet of boats manned by Irish fishermen. Today we meet these boats on every coast of the British Isles.

Now if a similar scheme were adopted here, and the government supplied boats and gear to men who were able and willing to fish, say a sufficient number to give say one boat to every 20 square miles for 500 miles along the coast, these boats could operate these waters, and found the seasons for herring, and I claim that it is practically all the year round.

Now, we have here canneries that are idle for the greater part of the year, that could be well used for herring, and a drydock which could build the wooden boats necessary, with lumber sufficient within a stone's throw of Rupert. The expense would be trifling, but the benefits immense. We have plenty of men who could man these boats and who have practical experience in herring fishing, and we have women too who can cure the fish, and who could teach other women how to cure, and we have canneries to put them up for export for Australia, New Zealand and Japan. The Oriental trade is ours and this is the terminus. Are we asleep, or is the government? Now is the time to do something practical. Our soldiers are returning, and here is an industry which many would find congenial.

All I have said I can bring facts to prove, and I am sure every fisherman will agree with me. I live on Porcher Island in the midst of an abundance of salmon and herring, and I have fished all my life.

**SOME SIDELIGHTS ON INDIAN LIFE**

Last evening at the St. Andrew's Society, the Rev. W. E. Collison gave one of the most interesting addresses which it has been the privilege of the Society to hear. His subject was one which he was fitted to deliver and for residents in this northern B. C. was of a peculiarly instructive nature. The speaker told of the six tribes in this district and how their languages were so different. He enlarged upon the difference between the Indians on the coast and the Indians of the interior. The latter are tall, spare, stolid, dignified and nomadic, while the coast Indians are short, quick-witted and lived in splendid settlements. Their language, mythology and origin were very interestingly dealt with. It is the opinion of the lecturer that at some remote period, the coast Indians could claim Asiatic descent, as distinct from the American descent of the tribes further east, in the interior.

The ideas conveyed by and the formation of their languages were explained, and also their marriage customs, which bound the various tribes together. The Salique law is unknown among the coast bands, as descent is claimed through the maternal parent.

The Rev. Mr. Collison's address was listened to with intense interest by those present, and all would certainly like to hear Mr. Collison on the same subject again. The evening was enlivened with musical numbers.

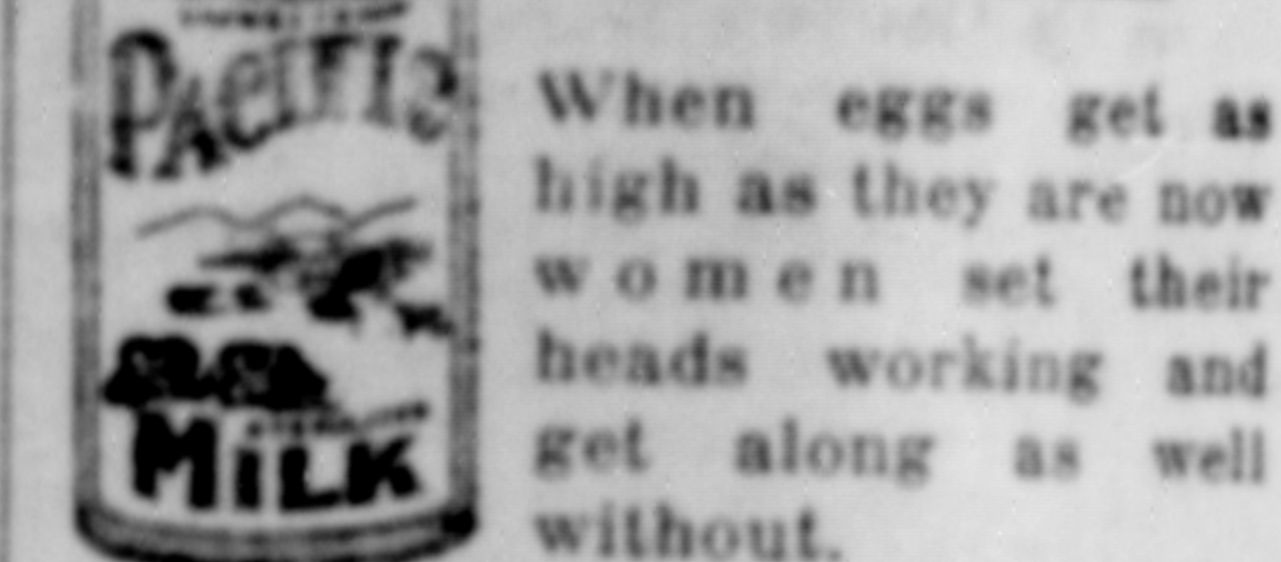
