## BRITISH AT BOURLON THREATEN HUN LINE

### Another Strategic Retiral is Imminent as Result of Steady British Pressure.

London—The situation in Hainault, says the military correspondent of "The Pall Mall Gazette" is extremely interesting. From a point south of Lens the British line runs for 18 miles a little east of south to Bullecourt, thence (sagging slightly south so as to run round Queant) nine miles southeast round Masnières, whence, finally, it runs 18 miles south to St. Quentin. Now the Hindenburg switch line runs from Queant, 15 miles north, to Crocourt, and our position at Bourlon overlooks this line from its left rear.

### Hindenburg's Switch Line.

It also commands the Douai-Cambrai railway to the northeast, and Cambrai itself to the southeast. The Hindenburg switch line covers Douai, and its retention alone renders it possible for the Germans to hold Lens. If it goes Lens must fall, and we shall push our line up to Douai, which means that Lille will be threatened from the south as well as from the north.

Well may Sir Douglas Haig say that our success in front of Cambrai may have far-reaching consequences.

At the same time our capture of the high ground around Passchendaele enables us to command the forest of Houthulst and the remainder of the Ypres ridge right away to Dixmude.

If we can hold Bourlon Hill the Hindenburg switch line must go, with all its consequences. If we can hold the Passchendaele heights the whole ridge must go, with all that depends on it.

The situation created by our capture of the heights about Bourlon and Passchendaele place the enemy in a most unfavorable position, which, if he really has the men available, he must retrieve by the recovery of these two supremely important tactical points. Should he succeed it will be at a price comparable with that he paid for the capture of the Ypres ridge three years ago—a cost which crippled him for months, but this time he cannot replace his losses. Should he fail he will lose his positions on the coast; he must retire from before the ridges; Lens must fall, and Cambrai and St. Quentin will follow.

It is quite possible that time will show that the least result of our victories is to attract the whole of Germany's strategic reserves, and thus to save all our Allies from attack.

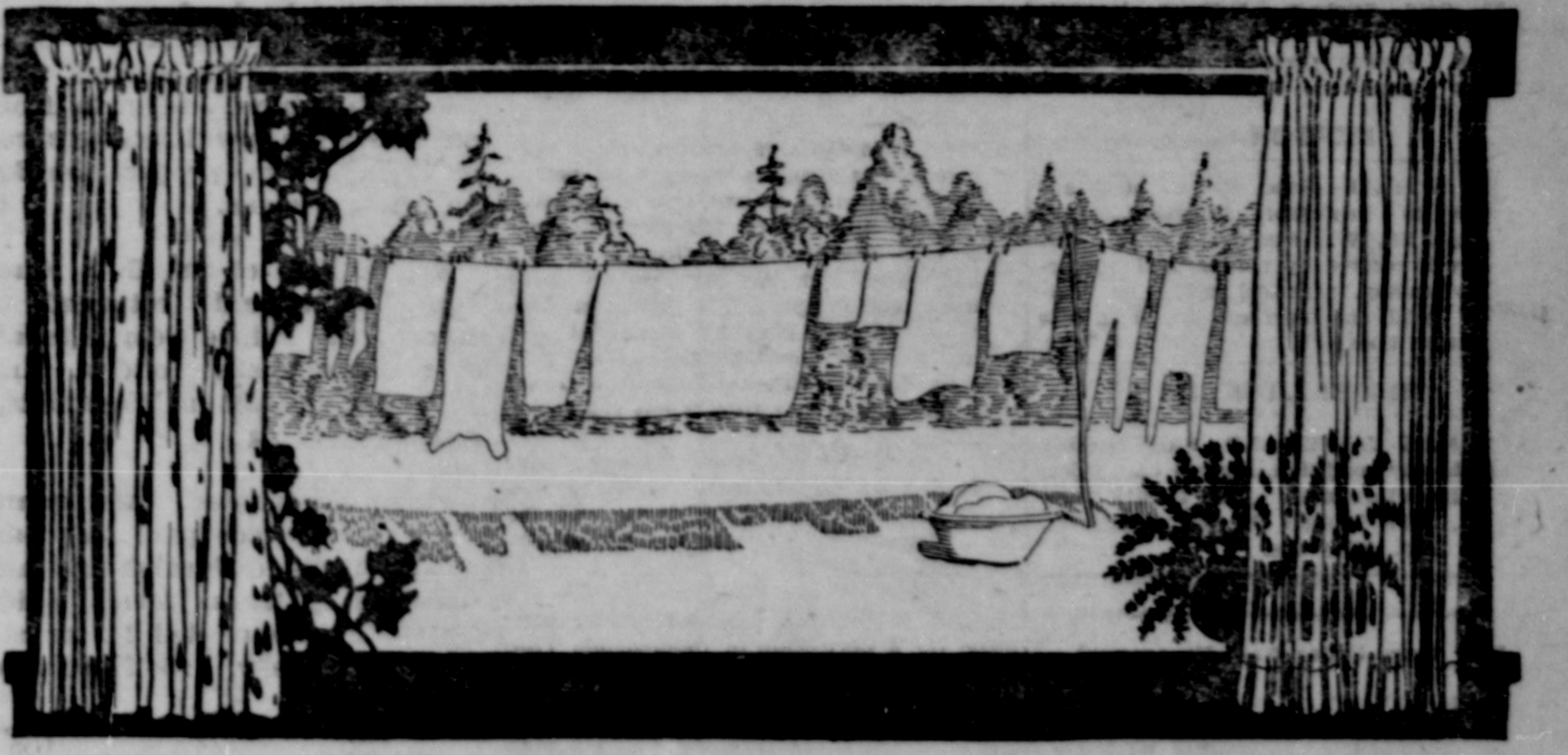
