WAR INDUSTRY

"Growing foodstuffs in Canada is not an ordinary business at present. It is a war industry and must be so regarded by the Government and the people generally, as well as by the men and women engaged in it. If voluntary workers cannot be secured to carry on the industry, the State must step in and exercise the power of compulsion." Thus the Toronto Globe on the world food question. It says further, "If the Allies fail for lack of food, that failure will be ours as much as theirs, and its consequences will be felt by us and those who come after us for many a long year. If men to grow food are as necessary to the success of the allied cause as men to bear arms, why should the principle of selective conscription not be as applicable to the growing of food as to the raising of armies."

The Globe here raises another aspect of the question which has been at the back of most people's minds, and which only a few have had the temerity to enunciate so far. What is the difference in taking men by compulsion to fight for their country and ours, and taking other men by compulsion to work for the welfare of the nation, at the same price?

The State needs men to fight her battles. The state needs men to build her ships. The state needs food for her soldiers and for her allies. The state needs guns and shells to destroy the enemy. The state needs clothing and war supplies of every description. The one of these things without the other is useless. They must all be utilized in their due proportion together. Yet, the principle of compulsion is applied only to the supply of men. And after all, the human element is the greatest asset which the state possesses. The man who produces the food, the man who builds her ships, the man who makes the shells and guns and clothing and other war material is induced to do his utmost by the prospect of larger profits than were customary in peace time. He runs no more risk

than ordinary. Yet the state in its open-eyed injustice takes men from the safety of their civil occupations, to risk their lives for a smaller indemnity than they would otherwise be receiving.

The injustice of the present system is manifest and only by placing all of the workers upon the necessities of the state upon the same basis will the anomaly be removed.

The man producing food, shells, guns and so forth is doing his share to win the war to his own profit, while the soldier does his bit to win the war at a considerable sacrifice. The soldier has no equity more than the man who stays at home in the gains accruing to the state through warlike operations.

In the eyes of the law, all men are equal, as we are taught they are before the Deity. But the equalizing process has a long way to go, although progress may be made very quickly—much quicker than may be imagined.

- 2—Over \$500,000 and up to and including \$1,000,000, \$500,000 in full and seventy-five per cent. of the balance.
- 3—Over \$1,000,000, same as for first million and fifty per cent. of amount in excess of \$1,000,000.
