BIG DEMAND FROM U. S. FOR IMPROVED FARMS ON PRAIRIE

Edmonton, Jan. 19.—A visit to the offices of some of the dealers in farm lands in the city show that they are piled up with enquiries from the United States for farms. These enquiries are coming from all parts of the West and even down to Southern California. They are all practical farmers and are attracted to the wheat lands of Alberta. There are some enquiries from Ontario also, but the great immigration this year is expected from the United States farmers. Many of them ask for a lease of a well stocked farm with the option of buying at the end of two or three years. This is a deal, however, that the Canadian farmers are not anxious to make and in fact will not hear of it. There are a number of our Alberta farmers who have collected sufficient fortune during the last few years that they are now ready to retire and especially in the case of those who are advancing in years, they are willing to sell out at a fair bargain on account of the expected shortage of labor. In this way many good bargains in farm lands are to be had. The American buyers generally have no idea of going out to the hinterland, they want land within easy distance of the railroads and farms with plenty of broken land on them and where possible lots of stock and seed grain. They have money to pay the price and have no notion of doing pioneer work.

BOLSHEVIKI ARREST ROUMANIAN MINISTER

London, Jan. 19.—The Roumanian Minister at Petrograd and his entire staff have been arrested by the Bolsheviki government, it is announced by the Roumanian legation here. These arrests are believed to have been made in reprisal for the arrest of a number of Bolsheviki agitators at Jassy, the present capital of Roumania.

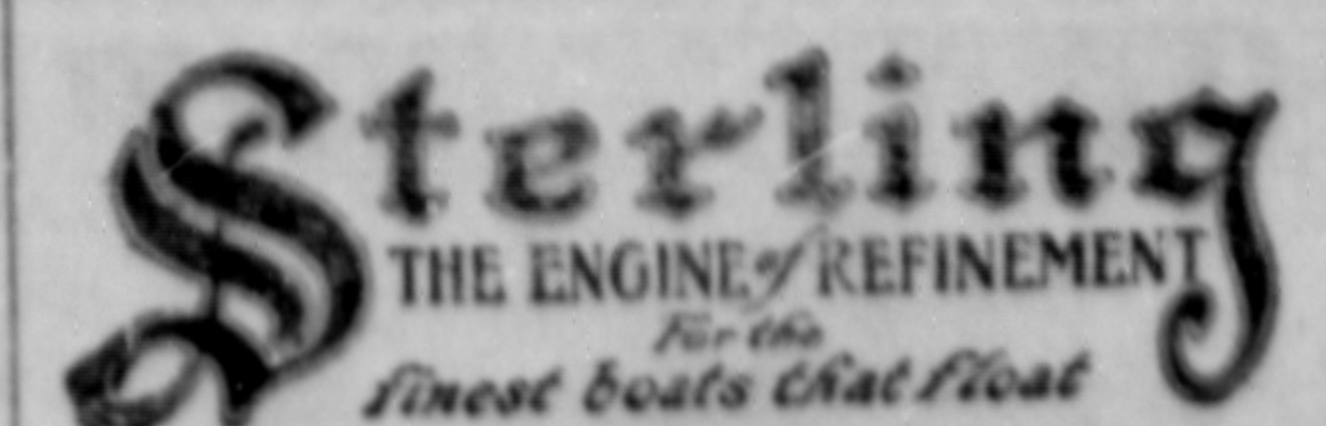

RECONSTRUCTION PLANS ARE LAID IN GERMANY

Copenhagen, Jan. 19.—German resources in finance, industry, workmen, and shipowners are now being busily employed in preparations for the reopening of German trade and civil industry after the war. Some days ago a company was formed at Hamburg for the purpose of restoring German overseas trade.

According to the "Taegliche Rundschau," a similar company has been formed in Berlin with a million marks capital. The company has plans ready for the new great overseas undertaking, such as harbors, railways, and waterworks, which, as a whole, until now were carried out by British companies.
