DEVELOPMENT

One of the matters which has been advocated for quite some time in this district, and even in other parts of the province is the closer control of the government of Canada over the disposal of the resources of the Dominion. The practice has been hitherto for the capitalist, of whatever nationality, who had the necessary capital, to come to Canada and export therefrom her raw products. This is exemplified in the matter of her metalliferous wealth. The foreign capitalist, and there are many of them, have come to this country. They have operated mines. They have exported the ore, and except for the wages paid for the mining, Canada is none the better. This ore is no good until it is smelted and refined, and once it goes without the boundaries of this Dominion, the government have no longer any control over its disposal.

For instance, from two of the biggest producers on the British Columbia coast, a rough calculation shows that there are about four thousand tons of concentrates and blister copper sent out of this country per month. So far as manufacturing purposes are concerned, this metal is useless until it has been refined and to that end it has to go to another country.

When it is remembered that this four thousand tons comes from only two of the companies operating in B. C., it does not need much perspicacity to see that this refining could as well be done in the country of origin of the ore. A refinery established in British Columbia, and in Prince Rupert, which is its logical place, would give constant employment for at least three hundred men, and then, in time of necessity, this wealth of Canada would be available, and of some use.

The situation with regard to Canadian nickel is a case in point. Even after the war had broken out the Germans were enabled to purchase manufactured and refined nickel which had been exported from Canada. As this had been export-

ed in its raw state for refining, it thereby passed out of the control of the Canadian government and was used against our own soldiers. Had it been refined in this country, the government could have known where the finished product went to and so controlled its disposal and prevented it getting into enemy hands. Besides which, a further industry would have been added to those already existing in the Dominion.

The matter is one which calls for action in the near future. There is enough blister copper and concentrates produced in British Columbia, and even in Northern British Columbia at that to keep a refinery going. The same might not be said for a smelter just yet, but that day is rapidly coming. Prince Rupert and British Columbia wants industries. This is one which lies at our door, if we want it had enough.

GERMANY MAKING A DIRECT LEVY ON WEALTH

Amsterdam, January 29.—Proposals for a levy on wealth to help pay the expenses of war are being considered by Germany. The Frankfort Zeitung declares that it has already been decided to make a direct levy, which will be several times as large as that of 1913, when a "defense tax" of \$250,000,000 was levied on fortunes to furnish money for putting the German army and navy on a war basis.

SOMETHING NEW IN HOUSEHOLD ECONOMY

Paris, Jan. 15.—(By Mail)—French chemists are advocating the use of sea water in the making of bread. This would not only save the transportation of salt, it is urged, but would add materially to the healthful properties of the bread, owing to the fact that sea water contains, besides salt, a valuable percentage of magnesium and calcium. Ocean water is already being used, it is said, in bread baking at Cherbourg, and the bread has gained a considerable reputation as a diet in various complaints.

HOW AUSTRALIA WILL LOOK AFTER SOLDIERS

New York, Jan. 26.—Methods adopted in Australia for the rehabilitation of returned soldiers were described by Crawford Vaughan, former Premier of South Australia, in an address at the Harvard Club today. Each soldier at the front has been asked to state whether he desires to settle on the land upon his return from active service. More than fifty per cent. have answered this in the affirmative, and for that reason the Government has decided to test the capabilities of the soldiers as farmers before making allotment.

Soldiers' training farms have been established at which the men are given courses lasting from four to six months. They are paid \$1.50 a day for seven days a week, with double rations for a married man, single rations for single men and quarters. A comfortable bunkhouse is provided for the single man, while the married man and his family occupy separate huts. Instruction is given in irrigation, dry farming, stock raising and horticulture.

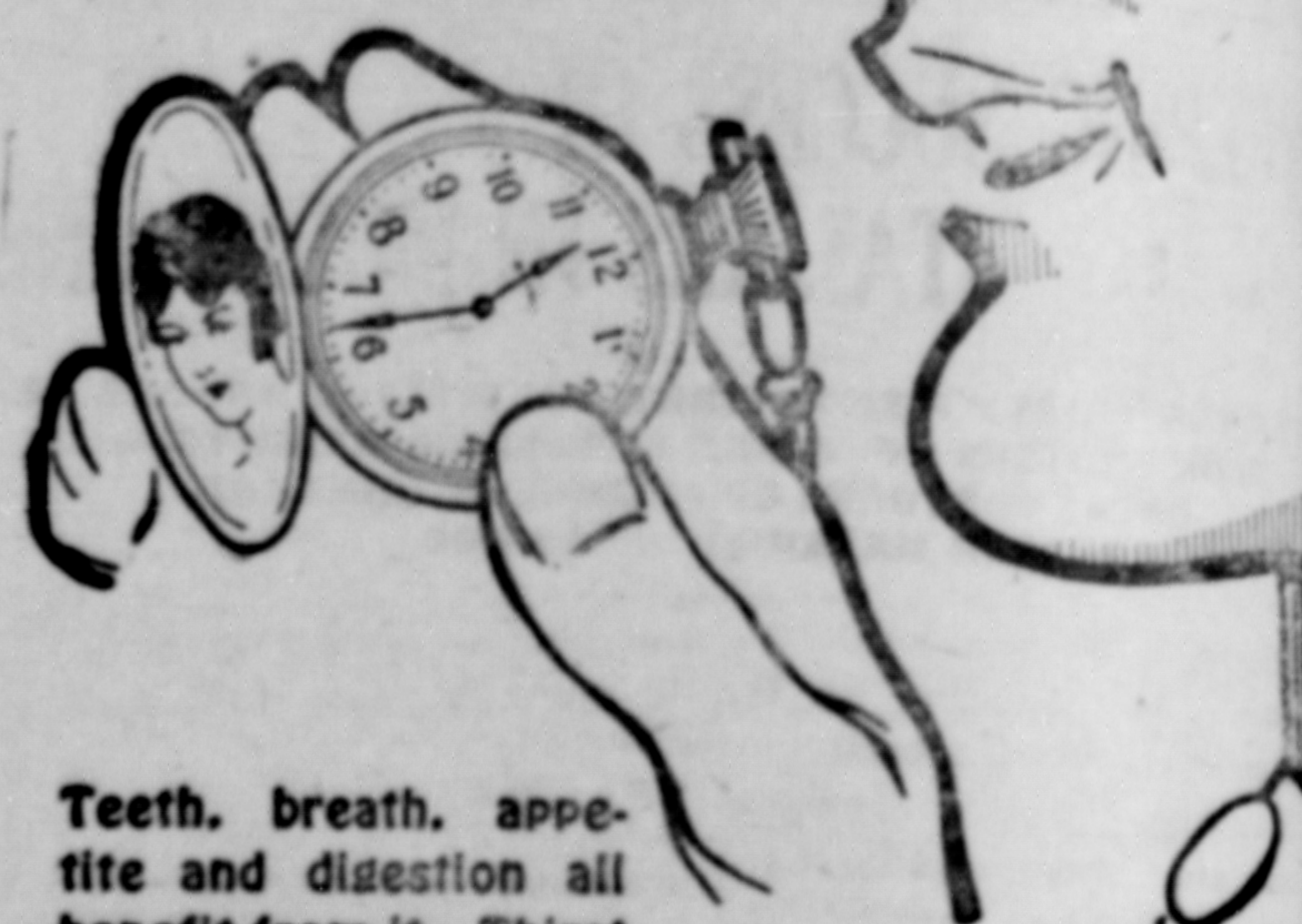
