TIME AND CHANCE

There are many of the residents of Prince Rupert, particularly those who have been here for more than the last five years, who are still buoyed up with optimism, for which there was such good grounds, that number of years ago. With discerning people, the longer they stay here, the greater the grounds they have for that optimism, which brought them here in the first place. They had every belief that this city was bound to develop and quickly, too, as a terminal city ought to be expected to. They still hold that belief, and now, after, in some cases, quite a period of that heart sickness brought about by "hope deferred," that belief seems about to be justified.

Justification of the faith in the quick progress of Prince Rupert has seemed at many times, especially within the last three years, notwithstanding war conditions, or because of them, possibly, seemed to be at hand. But while there has been progress, it has been comparatively slow, and because of that not quite so apparent to the average citizen. However, the race is not to the swift, nor the battle to the strong, but time and chance happeneth to all. Now seems to be the time when the chance is come, for a period of permanent development to the city, and to the surrounding district. Hardly ever before have the prospects seemed so bright for the immediate future.

In times past a favorite occupation was to build castles in the air, which after all is the proper place for such, only first of all, the foundations have to be evident. The foundations have been here all the time, but in many cases covered with muskeg and seaweed. It has taken time to get the muskeg cleared away, and the seaweed cut off, and the true foundations disclosed. There can be no doubt that the basic qualities necessary to the up-building of a large city are present, even at the present time. Just as "an city, set on a hill cannot be hid," neither

can the wealth of natural resources contained in the territory tributary to this centre fail to attract attention.

The wealth of the everlasting hills, of the sea, and of the forest are ours in illimitable vastness, waiting for us to get it, and as a centre the supplying of the requirements of the business of winning this wealth belongs here as well.

Arising out of war conditions Prince Rupert district's industries, fishing, lumbering and mining, are flourishing, and the demand for the products of these industries is increasing, and at good prices. With the addition of another industry which belongs to the coast, and all the subsidiary trades and businesses which follow these staple ones, which are bound to follow, a permanent basis for further and more far-reaching development will be laid.

INTENSIVE METHODS

One of the features which in past years struck the traveler in Belgium, in that country now occupied by the Germans, was the manner in which every inch of ground there was made to do its part in supporting the population. Perhaps the most densely populated country in Europe, with a people industrious, hard working and economical, Belgium afforded an example of national thrift which can hardly be excelled.

The country was small, and the population proportionately large, and every inch of ground which could grow a cabbage was not neglected. Intensive culture was the rule, not the exception, as in this country.

In Canada the conditions are reversed. In farming, in fishing, in lumbering and in many other of the chief businesses of the country, production has been brought about by methods extensive rather than intensive, which in its turn has meant a very great deal of waste. At the present moment, waste is a national crime, and the time is near at hand when it will be dealt with as such.

It is only necessary to glance at the chief industries to see the waste which goes on. There
