Mr. Editor—Please grant me space to clear up a rumor to the effect that I am scabbing at the drydock.
I am a ship's rigger by trade, and still retain my card with the Ships Riggers Association on the Clyde. I have also many references from masters of vessels, and have worked in a great many ship yards in different parts of the world, and this is the first time I was ever painted as a scab. Riggers' wages for the Pacific coast is \$5.25 per day. I have been receiving that wage since it was signed up in Vancouver; previous to that I received the same wages as that paid in the Vancouver yards, and being the only rigger at the dock, I fail to see where I am working under unfair conditions.
I wish to make it clear to the people of Prince Rupert and especially to Union men whom it may concern that I am a Union man, first, last, and always, and am not now, nor will I in the future violate Union principles.
