WHAT NEXT IN RUSSIA

The chief interest in European matters at the present time is the situation as we are permitted to know it, obtaining in Russia. Little less than a year ago, the Russian Moujik, with some kind of cohesion brought about by three years' service in the army, together with the revolutionary forces which have been operating for years past in the larger cities throughout the country, secured the downfall of the autocratic government of the Czar and his bureaucrats. Some of these feudal lords, and princely personages were killed out of hand, but of the remainder little has been heard since the time of the revolution. And they are not the kind of people to take a licking lying down. They submitted to the superior force at the time, believing that discretion was the better part of valor.

Now we see the armies of the Kaiser invading Russia, in the direction of Petrograd, after the signing of peace terms by the supposed leaders of the Russian people. This invasion is to the northern part of Russia, when all the material which would be of the greatest use for the German Empire at the present time lies in the southern provinces. This material is food. For her immediate necessities, one would have thought that the Kaiser's forces would have penetrated into the country of the Ukraine first.

Apparently they have some ulterior purpose. This can only be the re-establishment of the Czar Nicholas back on his throne. Autocratic Germany could not see with pleasure a democratic France on her one border and a democratic Russia on her other. Her best defence to the east would be an autocratic government, like as the Czar's. It is safe to say that something of this nature is impending.

Willy and Nicky will be friends to the last, as long as there is something to be gained. The one without the other could not hope to maintain themselves in Europe as the

sole representative of the feudal ages. The ex-Czar Nicholas for all that he would be in his villa in the Crimea raising flowers, doubtless would not object to be replaced as the Czar of all the Russias, even with the help of his friend Wilhelm, Kaiser of all the Germans. Besides, the Kaiser has a great deal to thank the former bureaucrats for. Did they not paralyze the striking power of the Russian armies when they were on the victorious march through Austria? Did they not tie up the Russian railroad system so that supplies and ammunition could not be got for the front line? Did they not time and again send across to the German lines the very plans of the Russian commanders, whereby their bravery in the field was brought to naught.

If there be any truth in the old saw that there is honor among thieves, then Kaiser Wilhelm has got a big debt to pay to these late officials of the Czar's government, individually and collectively. There can hardly be any doubt that the Russian people today are heartily wishing that these days of turmoil and internal dissensions were over and done with. But whether the re-entry of the Czar to the throne of his fathers is too big a price for them to pay, remains to be seen.

of considerable importance took place at Winnipeg the other day, which carries some significance. The Ukrainian Social Democratic party of Canada, representing the quarter million citizens of this Dominion, held a mass meeting in which a resolution was passed offering to the government the mobilization of Ukrainian labor for production and other war purposes provided the stigma of being alien enemies was removed, and fair treatment was secured from Canadian farmers. While this offering is conditional, still it shows what one section of the Canadian people are prepared to do off their own bat.

There is no doubt that in Canada today, there could be found sufficient supplies of labor for all essential war purposes, were it brought to bear where it is most required. There is much unproductive work going on, from a war point of view, and there are many men filling jobs which could be quite well performed by women. They have had to get down to this seriously in Great Britain, and in this respect, Canada is still far from being at the end of her resources. It is all a matter of organizing. If Canada is to be kept a white Canada, the white population must be prepared to do the work which is necessary to be done.
