### CHANGES EXPECTED IN BRITISH CABINET—HUNS PREPARING NEW PEACE TERMS

WOULD HAVE GERMAN AVIATORS RETALIATE, UPON OPEN TOWNS FOR CONFISCATION OF FOUR HUNDRED GERMAN SHIPS—FRENCH AVIATORS BOMB GERMAN HANGARS BEHIND LINES.

Amsterdam, March 14.—The destruction of four hundred British towns by German aeroplanes is the demand made by the Berlin Tages Zeitung, as a reprisal for the action of the allies in confiscating four hundred German merchant ships. The article making this demand is a boastful one, and evidently written for the purpose of infusing a little more courage and hopefulness in the people of Germany. The writer gets downright angry at the idea of the allies utilising the "beautiful German ships" for their own inhuman purposes, these said purposes being the bringing of food stuffs and munitions and troops from the United States and Canada to Great Britain and France. The biblical injunction of "an eye for an eye" is altered to "a town for a ship" apparently with great satisfaction to the German writers.

#### AUSTRIANS GET COLD FEET ON ITALIAN FRONT

Rome, March 13.—The "Idea Nazionale" learns from its Berne correspondent that, during the month of February, no fewer than 10,000 Austrian soldiers had to be withdrawn from the Italian front suffering from frozen feet. Confirmation is given to the report by the fact that Austrian prisoners who have been taken recently have been found to be badly shod, their boots being exceedingly poor quality and quite incapable of resisting the intense cold which has recently prevailed in the Italian Alps.

#### FOUR THOUSAND CIVILIANS MOVED FROM CAMBRIA

Amsterdam, March 13.—"Les Nouvelles," of Maastricht, learns from The Hague that 4,000 persons, evacuated from Cambria, have arrived at Pepinster, near Liege.

They had travelled 33 hours without food, and ten persons died during the journey.

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#### GERMANS PREPARING FOR ANOTHER NEW PEACE MOVE

(Special to The Daily News.)  
London, March 14.—According to the Morning Post's Berne correspondent, preparations are being made through the German newspapers and German Press agents, for a new political move. This correspondent says that it is possible a fresh peace move is contemplated, on the basis of the status quo ante bellum prior to the war on the Western front, with recognition of the present frontiers being recognized again, while the captures of territory which the Germans have made at the expense of Russia in the East, they would be allowed to retain. Vigorous comment has been made upon this understanding of the matter, as it is even better for the Germans that their previous proposals of a peace upon the basis of the then war map.

Needless to say, any such proposals would get equally scant consideration from the allies, as they did their last ones. The determination is again expressed that the Germans must first be ejected from the lands of France and Belgium before any peace can be discussed.

#### BRITISH AIRMEN INFLICT GREAT DAMAGE ON GERMANS

London, March 14.—Aerial attacks upon places of military importance behind the German lines are being continued by the British aviators. Yesterday, one squadron of the British flyers attacked the city of Freiburg in Germany and dropped ten tons of bombs upon the munitions factories and the barracks. Great damage was done, and the destruction was visible to the airmen. The munition factories were hit several times, and the buildings were seen to explode, as their inflammable contents caught fire. The barracks, which are extensive ones, were also seen to be on fire in several places.

In the ancient city of Burges in Belgium, three tons of bombs were also dropped. The Railway station was hit, and a standing train was seen to burst into flames.

On Tuesday, over thirteen tons of explosives were dropped at various targets within the German lines. The German aviators tried their best to cope with the British attack and in the fighting that followed, twenty two of the German machines were sent crashing to the earth, and the remainder were driven off. The British squadrons were enabled to make their way homeward unopposed by the enemy machines.

Last night, the hostile airships again attacked the north east coast of England.

#### THREE MONTHS JAIL FOR CAPTAIN BAILEY

#### GERMAN SOCIALISTS ARE DISSATISFIED WITH PEACE

Amsterdam, March 14.—Commenting on the outcome of the Brest-Litovsk conference at which a peace treaty with the Bolshevik Government was concluded, the Berlin Socialist newspaper Vorwaerts says:

"Peace was concluded, but the delegates parted with feelings of deadly enmity. That such was the case is deeply regrettable. The German workmen do not stand be-

hind von Rosenberg (assistant to Foreign Secretary von Kuehlman and chairman of the second Brest-Litovsk conference) or the policy for which he stands. Let us therefore face the facts and frankly declare that in this peace the success which was sought has been denied to Socialism of all shades of opinion."

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#### UNITED STATES BATTERIES DO GREAT EXECUTION BEHIND GERMAN LINES

ARTILLERY FIRE REACHES ITS GREATEST INTENSITY AT SEVERAL POINTS—FIVE GROUPS OF FLAMMENWERFER OBLITERATED, AND MANY AMMUNITION DUMPS WERE EXPLODED.

Paris, March 14.—In the Woivre district, a detachment of United States troops carried out with success a raid in the German trenches, to the south of Richcourt. Artillery fire by the American batteries has attained to its greatest intensity at several points. Five groups of German gas projectors, which were all ready to be used, were obliterated by the shell fire. Towns back of the German lines were set on fire, and large quantities of ammunition placed in new dumps were searched out and blown up yesterday.

The strength of the bombardment which is in progress all along the allied line is being well kept up by the batteries of the United States artillery. They have worked enormous havoc with the German defences, and in several places, the German first line trenches have been filled in and rendered useless for defence. Raids which the troops have made from time to time, have disclosed the fact that at several points, the Germans have been compelled to withdraw their lines, for in some

#### AGREEMENT RE FISHERIES IS GOT WITH U.S.

Long Standing Question Between the Two Countries is Now Settled for Duration of the War.

Ottawa, March 14.—The important announcement is made by the Minister of Marine and Fisheries here today that an arrangement which settles the long standing question of fisheries between the United States and Canada, has now been reached. It will remain in force at least for the duration of the war. This new agreement provides for the complete reciprocity of port privileges for fishing craft of the two countries, and it is hoped that the friction which for many years has been in evidence on the Atlantic coast will be obviated.

#### GERMAN FORCES OVERRUN UKRAINA

London, March 14.—The German forces are reported to have entered the city of Odessa, which is the great port of export from the granary of Russia.

Roumanians Persecuted.  
Washington, March 14.—The Roumanian minister reports that Roumania is being subject to the most drastic persecution at the hands of German, who have practically taken over control of the whole country, as they did in Belgium.

#### French Front.

Paris, March 14.—Mutual artillery bombardments along the right bank of the Meuse, and in the Railloan, Angerville and Lorraine regions was reported by the French War office last night. In the Argonne, and in the Vosges yesterday, the artillery fire was intermittent. In the Champagne country, the bombardment was violent, especially in the region of Mons. Reports from the watching aeroplanes said that the French guns had made several hits upon the German batteries, and that several of their big guns had been put out of action.

#### British Front

London, March 14.—A strong party of the enemy raided a British post south of Armentieres last night, following upon a heavy bombardment. A few British soldiers are missing.

#### BATTERIES ACTIVE ON MOUNTAIN FRONT

Rome, March 14.—The official statement issued today by the Italian War office says:

"Yesterday our heavy batteries were more active on the mountainous front from the Adige River to the Piave River. Enemy troops and working parties were shelled on the plateau Tonesecca, at the Aasa-Hastico confluence at the head of the Val Frenzela."

"Counter-battery firing by hostile artillery was lively in the region of Mantello and less active on the west front."

"Northwest of Monte Grappa our patrols attacked with hand grenades enemy outposts."

"Our aircraft, notwithstanding adverse weather conditions, bombarded a big supply station of the enemy northeast of Orderzo."
