Local News Notes

The Prince Rupert will sail for Vancouver and the south at nine o'clock on Wednesday morning, arriving in Vancouver at 5 p.m. on Thursday afternoon.

The report from the Market Clerk for the month of February was received at the Council meeting last evening. It showed that the total turnover for the month was \$1,952.00.

The Board of Works Committee reported to the Council last evening against disposing of the old wooden pipe that had been taken from Hay's cove. It may be required somewhere soon.

The new Bylaw for the regulation of Bicycles and other vehicles was finally adopted by the Council last evening, and the corporate seal affixed. This means that anyone caught riding bicycles on the sidewalks, or being without a light after one hour after sunset, is liable to appear in the Police Court to answer for such delinquency.

A resolution was brought in to the Council meeting last evening re the appointing of a Court of Revision for this year's assessment roll. The Court will consist of his worship the mayor, together with Alderman Dybhavn, Rochester, Kirkpatrick, and Smith. They will sit on Friday the 26th of April to hear complaints against the assessment.

Mr. Gus Hanson, who has been in charge of the Quarantine launch "Evelyn" at Digby Island, accompanied by Mrs. Hanson, is leaving for Victoria tomorrow morning, whither his boat has been transferred. He will be attached to the Quarantine station at William Head, near Victoria. He has great hopes, however, that whenever the reopening of the station here is justified, which may be in the near future, that he will be transferred back again to the Skeena.

Permission was asked at the Council meeting last evening by Alderman McRae to bring in three bylaws for the borrowing of the sum of \$30,000. The City Clerk explained that while this money was not immediately required, it was necessary that the Council have the power to borrow, but before this could be done, it was required that the promissory note for the bank carry the signatures of the Mayor, and City Treasurer, the City Clerk, and all of the Finance Committee. These Bylaws received their first consideration last evening and will come up again for reconsideration a week hence.

The Income War Tax Act

Forms giving particulars of income for the year 1917, must be filled in and filed on or before the 31st March, 1918

Section 4 of the Act provides that all persons resident or ordinarily resident in Canada, shall pay a tax upon income exceeding \$1500 in the case of those single and widows and widowers without dependent children, and upon income exceeding \$3000 in the case of all other persons. It also provides that all Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, no matter how created, shall pay the normal tax upon income exceeding \$3000.

The Forms provided by the Department of Finance to be filled in with particulars of the 1917 income of all those whose incomes are liable under the Act, and by Trustees, Corporations and Joint Stock Companies, with information required of them, may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

Forms to obtain and Special Features to observe

Individuals—Get Form T 1 to give particulars of their own incomes. In stating Dividends received, give the amount from each Company, listing Canadian and foreign Companies separately. Fill in pages 1, 2 and 3 only. Do not mark on page 4.

The following sample returns, (printed in italics) to questions asked on pages 2 and 3 of Form T 1, will help you to fill in correctly your copies of the Form.

Corporations and Joint Stock Companies. Use Form T2—giving particulars of income. Also attach a financial statement. Under Deductions, show in detail amounts paid to Patriotic Fund and Canadian Red Cross or other approved War Funds.

Trustees, Executors, Administrators of Estates and Assignees use Form T3. Full particulars of the distribution of income from all estates handled must be shown as well as details of amounts distributed. A separate Form must be filled in for each estate.

Employers must use Form T4 to give names and amounts of salaries, bonuses, commissions and other remuneration paid to all employees during 1917 where such remuneration amounted in the aggregate to \$1000 or over.

Corporation Lists of Shareholders.—On Form T5 corporations shall give a statement of all bonuses, and dividends paid to Shareholders residing in Canada during 1917 stating to whom paid, and the amounts.

Penalties.—Default in filing returns renders the person or persons liable on summary conviction to a penalty of one hundred dollars for each day during which the default continues. Any person making a false statement in any return or in any information required by the Minister of Finance shall be liable on summary conviction to a penalty not exceeding ten thousand dollars or to six months imprisonment, or to both fine and imprisonment.

In the case of Forms T1 and T2, keep one copy of the filled in Form and file the other two with the Inspector of Taxation for your District. In the case of T3, T4 and T5, keep one copy and file the other two, with the Commissioner of Taxation, Dept. of Finance, Ottawa.

Forms may be obtained from the District Inspectors of Taxation and from the Postmasters at all leading centres.

voted, the bicycle bylaw was finally passed, bylaws to consider the borrowing of \$30,000 were considered for the first time, when we came to tenders. These had been called for the printing of the Collectors rolls. Somebody evidently had had the temerity to ask Vancouver to figure on this work, for there were two tenders from that place. McRae Bros. Ltd. would supply these big books for \$60; C. A. Roedde Ltd. of Vancouver figured at \$57.50, which with the express charges would probably be over the Prince Rupert figure, while the Vancouver Bindery quoted the price of \$44. It was decided that the Finance Committee deal with the matter.

After Alderman Casey said a few words about the monthly Departmental reports, which the council was not getting although he wanted them a while ago, and the reading room for ladies was ventilated, or at least the question was, there was nothing else to do but go home.
