## THE SPRING DRIVE

Once again the Western front is the scene of the major operations of modern warfare, with the beginning of the long expected and boasted about German offensive. Hindenburg himself has intimated that he expected to be in Paris by the first day of April. The choice of this particular date by Hindenburg was rather foolish, which another week will show. That his intentions were good, however, when he made this statement, is shown by the determination of the attacks which he has launched against the British line, between Arras and St. Quentin. With sixty divisions of troops engaged, doubtless it was expected by the mere weight of numbers, the Germans would push the British line back, and their advance would be hailed as another of the great victories, with which the German population have been regaled from time to time.

The fighting on this occasion seems to have been unexampled so far as concentration of men and guns is concerned, on both sides, and it is now possible that the battle now started may continue for months. One thing which all the dispatches received from France mention is the terrible losses inflicted upon the attacking Germans. Past history has proved that the attacking forces always stand to lose more men than the defenders, and in this instance, this is no exception. The massed battalions of the enemy advancing offered "remarkable targets" for the British forces, of which "full advantage" was taken, with rifles, machine guns and artillery. That Hindenburg still retains his favorite massed formation in making the attack shows that cannon fodder is still comparatively plentiful in Germany, and actually cheap.

Nearly two hundred years ago, at Malplaquet which is not so far from the present battlefield, which the British have fought over many times in the former centuries, the enemy of that time, who happened to be the French, were quite content with

the British victory, and would have accorded them the opportunity of such another, too, at the same price, which would have meant the total destruction of the British army. Marlborough, at that time, although his losses were enormous, was victorious. Hindenburg, at this time, and within a few miles of the same place, with tremendous losses, so far is not victorious.

If it be that the spirits of the departed take any interest in the continuous affairs of this world, then the shades of the warriors who have fought time and again over this same ground in bygone days will find much to interest them today. Almost since history began to be written, and even in times before that, since men combined for joint action in the fight, this particular piece of territory has been the scene of warfare. Cambrai, St. Quentin, Mons, Douai and Lille are prominent names in connection with military actions since the twelfth century, and it may well be that in this, the culmination of the most tremendous fighting that this world has yet seen, the end may be made to war for all time, right in the most continuously battle scarred territory in Europe.

## QUESTIONABLE METHODS.

Last week in Parliament at Ottawa, Sir Wilfrid Laurier had had somewhat to say to the government regarding its methods of conducting the election overseas. Laws have been made to regulate the conduct of the officials appointed to control the polling places in order that no undue influence may be imposed upon the voter. Sir Wilfrid drew attention of the House to a photograph of one of the polling booths in London on December, showing the interior of the booth, and the soldiers voting. Copies of this photograph have also been seen right here in town. What makes this particular photograph interesting is a poster stuck on the wall which read: "A vote against the government is a vote for the Hun." Such a poster, said Sir Wilfrid, in

in such a place was a violation of the law. If the law could be thus boastfully violated, it was easy to understand how much liberty the soldiers felt in casting their votes.

Continuing, Sir Wilfrid said that it was the misfortune of the government that by their own conduct they have failed to obtain the moral support which would be theirs had the campaign been fought under fair and honest methods.

When it is remembered that the opposition received three votes to every four that the Borden government got, and that every alien possible was disenfranchised, and the majority of the women excluded from expressing their opinion, the Borden government has thus publicly labelled a very large portion of Canadians.

Another thing that Sir Wilfrid mentioned was the statement of the Minister of Militia in November when he said that there were 35,000 soldiers in Canada, while on December 17, 52,000 soldiers votes were recorded. Where did they all come from? That is the question.

Possibly from the same place as all the extra soldiers who voted for Skeena!

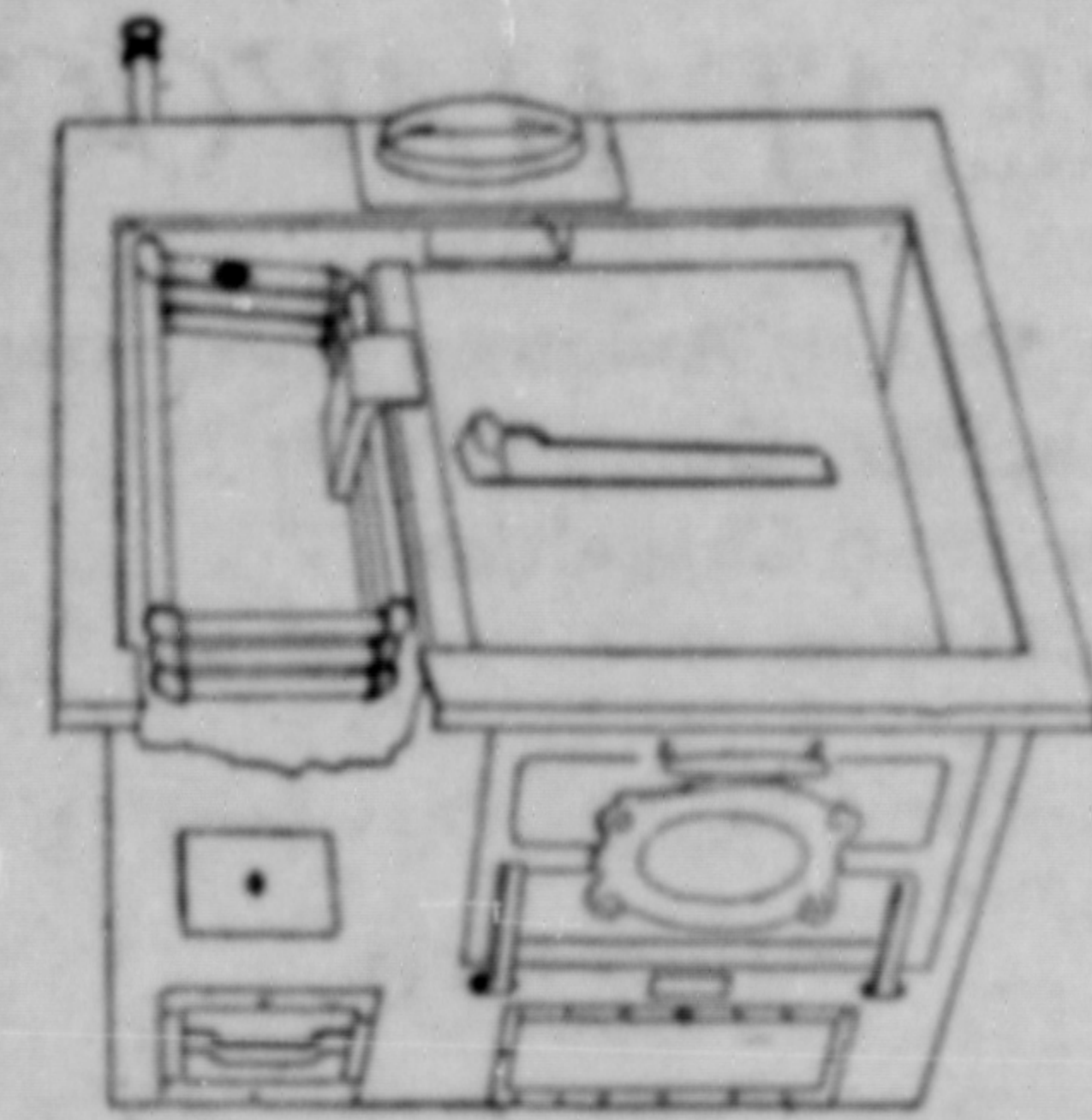
